4-H members representing all Alfalfa County schools and 4-H clubs attended an evening sewing class on Feb. 24 and March 3. 4-H sewing project leader Suzie Salinas, volunteers, Shirley Bichsel and Randy Leek, and Extension educator Megan Ferrell helped facilitate the classes. A total of 11 4-H members made a set of coasters in the two classes.

The youth were asked to purchase four fat quarters of coordinating fabric of their choice. They were taught how to iron their fabric and cut 5-inch squares, layer and pin the fabric and sew a simple coaster. Many of the participants had never sewn before. The coaster project is the same one the adults made in the Alfalfa County Extension C.A.F.E. lunchtime series on Feb. 4. It's a very quick and easy project.

Extension educator Megan Ferrell has encouraged 4-H members to learn to sew during the past few years with the help of local volunteers. They've sewn items such as pillowcases, laundry bags,













aprons, shorts, etc. All these items can be entered into the county fair competition. She recruits volunteers that are knowledgeable of sewing to help teach.

"I'm passionate about kids and adults learning to sew," Ferrell said. "I have completed a few projects with help, but I wasn't confident enough to teach sewing. I've made it a priority to host the classes, and I've gathered some fantastic volunteers to help the kids as well as myself with simple sewing projects. The absolute best part is the joy and sense of accomplishment on their little faces when they've finished sewing. Sewing machines as well as sewing projects can be rather daunting, however the more we are exposed to it, the better we become. Practice makes perfect."

Strengthening Oklahoma Families

Food and nutrition security continue to be problematic

The terms food security, nutrition security and hunger are often used interchangeably. Although the strategies to address these issues are connected, there are important differences that should be understood.

Food security is defined as a household in which all members at all times can access enough food for an active, healthy life. Some households may achieve this by purchasing enough food. Others, however, are considered food secure because they use food pantries, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and other food assistance resources.

Nutrition security is food quality, and the USDA defines it as all people in a household having regular and equitable access to healthy, safe and affordable foods that are essential to optimal health and well-being.

While some households are food secure, they can be nutrition insecure. They have access to enough food to keep them full, but the food lacks the necessary balance of vitamins and minerals required for healthy living.

Oklahoma has some of the worst food insecurity statistics in the country. More than 15% of households are food insecure, said Candy Gabel state coordinator for Oklahoma State University Extension's Community Nutrition Education Programs.

"About 15.4 Oklahoma households are food insecure. This places us as one of only seven states that has a food insecurity rate higher than the national average of 13.5%," she said. "More than 1.2 million Oklahomans live in low-income communities that have low access to nutritious food. While you might think that happens only in rural areas, research indicates over 1 million of them live in urban communities while 187,000 are located in rural areas."

Why is food and nutrition insecurity a concern? Hunger is connected to higher poverty rates and costs Oklahoma more than \$1.4 billion each year through increased illness and decreased academic achievement. Food insecurity increases chronic illnesses, including diabetes, obesity, hypertension, and kidney disease.

Moreover, food-insecure children in Oklahoma are more likely to have lower reading and math scores and increased behavior and social problems. Food insecurity can also impact high school graduation rates.

"Food insecurity weakens the labor force, decreases educational attainment, and increases healthcare costs in Oklahoma," she said. "And while food insecurity and poverty aren't the same, they are related. Other factors that are associated with the lack of access to adequate, nutritious food include higher unemployment, lower household assets and some demographic characteristics."

Some rural communities are food deserts, meaning a quarter of the town's population lives more than 10 miles from a grocery store. Those areas may have convenience stores, but the food sold there is typically much more expensive and doesn't offer the variety needed for a

healthy diet. In addition, these areas have fewer charitable food service options than urban areas.

Gabel said nearly 80% of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program participants are children, elderly or disabled. In 2023, more than 900,000 Oklahomans relied on SNAP at some point during the year to meet their basic nutritional needs. Senior citizens sometimes have to choose between buying food or paying for medical care and prescriptions. In addition, about two-thirds of Oklahoma public school students participate in the free or reduced-price meal program.

"It's important for citizens to use the donated food/food pantries, private dollars, and state and federal resources to be able to put nutritious food on the table," she said. "Contact the OSU Extension office to learn more about the valuable resources available in your area. OSU Extension's Community Nutrition Education Programs can help empower limited-resource Oklahomans to improve their nutrition to help improve their quality of life."

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General Rules

- 1. All Classes are open to the general public. Must be a resident or in the school district of Alfalfa County.
- 2. Horticulture specimens must be grown by the exhibitor. Artistic department materials may be purchased or grown.
- 3. House plants must be in the possession of exhibitor for six weeks.
- 4. Flowers will be displayed in a narrow neck container or pop bottle.
- 5.All tea roses must be disbudded (remove all buds except the flowers to be judged.) Exhibit on an 8" to 10" stem with foliage.
- 6. All horticulture must be cleaned, groomed, and be bug free.
- 7. All arrangements must be made by the exhibitors
- 8. Accessories may be used in all classes of arrangements.
- 9. The flower show committee will not be responsible for containers or accessories, but all care will be taken to protect properties.
- 10. The show will be judged by the standard method of judging.
- 11. Special awards will be given to the Best of Show in, Artistic,
- Horticulture Arboreal / Greenery, Iris and Other Blooming Thing.
- 12. Individuals are limited to 2 entries per class.
- 13.African Violets should not be entered if they have double crowns.
- 14.No artificial or painted materials which represent horticulture item will be allowed in any fresh arrangement. (Unless otherwise stated.)
- 15. All classes require fresh or live plants unless otherwise stated.
