The Free Fair Association earnestly solicits your support and your cooperation in making this fair a success, and no one factor does more to stimulate and improve farm and family life conditions than the County Fairs, where one may observe the improvements of farm crops, family life exhibits, animals, and compare them with their own.

The management appeals to you to lend your support that we depend on for a successful fair.

The Blaine County Free Fair Board reserves the right to reduce the premiums proportionately, if funds are not available, to pay off premiums in full as listed here.

The Blaine County Free Fair Association does not discriminate against eligible persons regardless of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, disability, or status as a veteran and is a member of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions as such:

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

Attention

Ir. Livestock Exhibitors:

In order to be eligible for the 2025 Bonus Auction, you must exhibit at least one animal; *or* enter two entries in the 4-H or FFA division in Foley Building (whichever organization you are a member of); *or* participate in the livestock judging or tractor driving contest at this years fair.

— BLAINE COUNTY FAIR RULES—

1. <u>Interpretation, Amendments, & Violations</u>

- a. Section 1 -The Board of Directors of the Blaine County Free Fair Association reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the Free Fair that shall be held under the management of this board.
- b. Section 2 -The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules, as they in their judgment deem advisable, without further notice. In the event of conflict of general and special rules, the latter will govern.
- Section 3 Any person who violates any of the special or general rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Board of Directors may order.

2. Entry Requirements

- a. All entries are free, but no unworthy entry will be received.
- All property of every character entered at the fairs for any purpose shall be subject to the control of the secretary or the superintendent in charge.
- c. All livestock entries at the County Fair must be made and in place not later than 7:00 p.m. Friday and livestock will be released after completion of show for each specie and pens are completely cleaned out. Any exhibitor removing exhibits prior to completion of the specie showing without fair board permission shall forfeit all premiums and shall be prohibited from participating in the next Bonus Auction.
- d. All non-livestock entries at the County Fair must be made and in place not later than 10:00a.m. Friday and shall remain in place until 3:00 p.m. Saturday. Any exhibitor removing exhibits prior to the release time & date without fair board permission shall forfeit all premiums.
- e. Entry forms will be provided for all entries of livestock and exhibitors are required to see that their exhib-

its are properly listed and tagged by the person in charge.

3. Exhibitors, Duties, & Privileges

- a. All exhibits of crops must have been raised by the exhibitors of Blaine County During the present year. All livestock must be owned by the exhibitors at the time of exhibiting the same.
- All exhibitors should ascertain from the various superintendents of departments at which time the exhibits under his charge will be judged; therefore, no complaint nor protest on the grounds that judges overlooked exhibits will be considered.
- The decision of the judges shall be final, and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest.

4. Protests & Appeals

- a. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Said protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and name and address of witnesses must be filed with the secretary of the Fair Board who in turn shall refer it to the Blaine County Fair Board whose decision shall be final. The protest of appeal must be made within 24 hours after the award is made.
- The Executive Board reserves the right to determine all questions regarding the awarding of premiums.
- c. In addition to the right of protest here-in granted to exhibitors, the directors reserve the right to take cognizance of fraud, consummated or attempted, in connection with any exhibit and take such action as they may deem just and proper.

5. Powers & Liabilities of Association

a. The fair management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit or animals that may have been entered falsely, or may be deemed unsuitable, or to remove any banner, or signature, or advertising matter of any kind which may seem objectable to them without giving any reason thetefore.

- b. No diseased animal will be permitted to be exhibited or to occupy the exhibit stalls at any of the fairs in the county, and every precaution will be exercised to enforce this rule, but the management will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may be sustained by anyone through violation of this rule.
- No claim for injury to any person for property shall ever be asserted e. or suit instituted or maintained against the Free Fair Association, its officers or agent or employees
- d. The Blaine County Free Fair Board does not discriminate eligible persons regardless of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, disability, or status as a veteran.

6. Premium Awards

- a. The following colors shall be used in designating awards:
 - Champion or Grand Champion— Purple
 - Reserve Champion or Reserve Grand Champion— Pink
 - First Premium—Blue
 - Second Premium—Red
 - Third Premium—White
- No premium will be awarded on articles not mentioned on the schedule of premiums.
- c. All livestock, poultry/rabbit, tractor driving, will be paid as soon as possible after the fair. In paying premiums, the evidence of award will be reports handed to the secretary/ treasurer by the superintendents of the different departments. Funding for premiums is to be allocated from the Blaine County General Fund-County Fair. Checks to be issued as soon as possible and delivered to each county school for distribution.
- d. All exhibitors of the Foley Building will be paid in cash at the time of the release of the non-livestock/ Foley Building Exhibits. The evidence of the awards will be the Superintendents' Books of the different departments. Indiscretion in the premiums paid will be handled only

- at the time of pay-out. The Superintendents' books will be final. (To protest a judge's decision, see Rule 4, section a-c.) Foley Building fair premiums for 2024 are donated by Blaine County OHCE members and groups. These funds are raised by various activities and fundraisers conducted by the Blaine County OHCE organization.
- Adult exhibitors forfeit premiums if they are not collected between 3:00—4:00 p.m. on Saturday. Premiums may be collected by other designated party with a photo I.D. Fair Board reserves the right to withhold premiums to said party, should there be suspicion of fraudulent activity.
- f. In the even special premiums are offered, they shall be paid directly by donors upon presentation of orders from the secretary.
- g. If, for any reason, funds are insufficient to cover expenses and sum of premiums offered, the Free Fair Board reserves the right to reduce premiums by sufficient percent in order to meet the application without further notice.

PREMIUMS TO ALL:

Fair premiums will be paid to all exhibitors. The source of funds for the premiums paid to 4-H/FFA/school age or preschool age are allocated from the Blaine County General Fund-County Fair. Premiums for the exhibits in the Foley Building are furnished by the Blaine County Oklahoma Home & Community Education (OHCE) Organization through fundraisers.

LIVESTOCK DIVISION GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibitors must wear a 4-H or FFA collared shirt, vest, pullover, or jacket with emblem of at least 2 ½ inches in size

- Requirement: To be eligible to show at the Baine County Fair livestock Show must be an enrolled 4-H or FFA member in Blaine County. To be a 4-H member must be 8 years old AND in the 3rd grade by September 1st.
- The exhibitor(s) who is entering the animal must have materially participated in the care of the project. Regarding student eligibility, if a student is declared ineligible after the entry deadline, any animal entered in that exhibitor's name shall be ineligible for exhibition.
- Female animals may exhibit in either the breeding classes or commercial breeding classes only. Market animals are not required to have registration papers. Animals must be truly representative of the breed.
- 4. All registered breeding classes will require registration papers at check-in. Required papers to be in individual's name (or meet household nomination requirements) and match the animal. If any problem with paper, animal will be allowed to go to commercial class. Commercial breeding classes will be weighed and the appropriate number of classes developed.
- Show officials are not liable for losses or injuries to animals, exhibitors, or spectators.
- Exhibitors must accompany their animals to the show, care for them, and exhibit them. In case of sickness or other conditions making this impossible, the Superintendent in charge can give permission for other members to show
- Immediate family members, teachers, exhibitors, active 4-H and FFA members of Blaine County are the only ones allowed to prepare animals for show.
- Show officials reserve the right to interpret all rules, to settle all questions and differences, and adjust awards to funds available.
- Ownership: To be eligible for Blaine County Fair, one must meet requirements of ownership stated by Tulsa State Fair.

- 10. When possible, there will be three (3) classes per breed in Beef, Market Swine, and Market Lambs. Classes will be divided proportionately according to weight and ages, NOT number in classes. Any additional classes will be provide for 1st through 10th place.
- 11. Ribbons will be provided for 1st through 10th place.
- Show order will be: Breeding classes, followed by market classes. Breed order is indicated in respective divisions.
- 12. No paint, powder, or dye will be permitted on Sheep, Cattle, or Goats during the entire show. Only clear coat dressing will be allowed. SWINE MUST HAVE WATER ONLY FOR HAIR AND SKIN COATING ON SHOW DAY. Any swine exhibit found in violation of oil rule will be omitted from show. The Fair is a Blow & Show ONLY!
- 13. The use of any diuretic drug for any purpose whatsoever on any animal in the show is prohibited, and will result in forfeiture of any placing, ribbons, premiums, or otherwise awarded to the animal.
- WEIGH-IN: Market cattle and Com-14. mercial Heifers will be weighed in by division superintendents. Minimum weight for market steers at Blaine County Fair is 1000 lbs. Less than 1000 lbs. will be prospect steers. **Minimum** weight for market lambs is 70 lbs. Wether goats must weigh at least 40 lbs. Wether lamb & commercial ewes must weight at least 70 lbs. Minimum and maximum weight for market swine is 150 lbs. and 270 lbs., respectively. Minimum and maximum weight for Commercial Gilts 150 lbs. and 375 lbs., respectively. Superintendent will weigh between 4:00 pm -6:00 pm on
- There will be no provision for showing animals either underweight or overweight.
- 16. All animals exhibited must be owned by the exhibitor. Refer to Rule #4.
- 17. Age of beef cattle are broken into quarter months. Ex. Jan-March.
- Calves must be broke to lead for the cow/calf pair classes. Calf is allowed to be shown in heifer or prospect division.
- Section for breeds and classes will be provided by superintendents as required.

- In order to be eligible for the Spring Bonus Auction, an exhibitor they must exhibit one animal: or enter two entries in the 4-H or FFA division in the Foley Building (whichever organization they are a member of); or participate in the livestock judging or tractor driving contest at the preceding Blaine County Fair. Exhibitors moving into Blaine County after the fall fair will be considered eligible if other eligibility 2. requirements are met. 'First Year' FFA & 4-H members that haven't been active in show programs previously will be exempt from fall fair livestock exhibiting to participate in spring Bonus Auction.
- 21. No force filling animals.
- 22. All infractions will follow the chain of command (i.e. make sure Ag Teachers, Extension Educator, and all Fairboard members are aware of the issue), with the decision of the Fairboard final.
- 23. Pee Wee Show (not 8 years old by September 1st & younger) (sheep, swine, or goat) Will show for showmanship awards only. Awards will be the same for all exhibitors. Classes will be broken at Superintendents' discretion.
- GOATS ONLY- three divisions (light, medium, & heavy.)

All swine to be shown must have pseudorables papers submitted to the Blaine County Extension Office no later than August 1st. No swine to unload at fairgrounds (for any event) until Superintendents match papers with ear tags.

Ag teachers are to supply a list of eligible exhibitors and the animals they will be showing (to include sex of specie) no later than August 1st to the Blaine County Extension Office.

SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST RULES

To qualify for Jr, Int., & Sr. Showmanship awards, you must have an entry in the respective specie you are being judged in. There shall be separate divisions competing in the showmanship contest with awards provided for winners in beef, sheep, swine, and goat divisions.

- All livestock must be in place by 7 p.m. Friday. Animals will be released after each specie is completed.
- There is no limit on number of animals that can be entered by an individual.
- Must be resident of Blaine County or attending Blaine County School.

FAIR SWEEPSTAKES BARNEY AWARD

To be eligible for the award, exhibitors must be a FFA member of either Canton, Geary, Okeene or Watonga or a 4-H member in any Blaine County 4-H Club.

Each exhibitor in the **Blaine County Fair** will be eligible for the Fair Sweepstakes Award. Points for placings listed below will be tallied and the winner of the Fair Sweepstakes Award will be announced at the conclusion of the livestock show at the County Fair. Points need to be turned 20 minutes after conclusion of sheep show.

THE EXHIBITOR DOES NOT HAVE TO DESIGNATE ANIMALS PRIOR TO THE SHOW, BUT ONLY TWO ANIMALS PER SPECIE CAN BE TURNED IN. POINTS MUST BE TURNED IN ON APPROPRIATE FORM.

No points will be given for school group (chapter or club), showmanship placings, cow/calf pairs or dairy, Champion & Reserve Champion English or Continental Breed Heifers, Champion & Reserve Champion All-Breed Registered Cilt, Champion & Reserve Champion All-Breed Registered Ewe.

Reserve Grand Champion—6 points
Division Champion (Goats only)—5 points
Breed Champion—5 points
Reserve Breed Champion—4 points
Res. Division Champion (Goats only)—4 points

If a tie, showmanship will be used for first tie breaker; if still tied, highest placing animals will be second tie breaker.

MINI BEEF SHOW & REGULATIONS

- Exhibitors must be between the ages of 3 and 8 years of age. However, any 3rd grader or 9-year-old is NOT allowed to participate if he/she has any other livestock at Blaine County Fair.
- 2. Participants in this division are required to show their animal. Participants 5 and under will be required to have a parental, siblings, or other participant accompaniment in the show ring. Participants are to handle the majority of the showing and use of the show stick. Assistance may help in the control of the animal. All participants are required to have a parental, siblings, or other adult accompaniment to the make ready arena.
- This exhibition is BLOW & SHOW only.
- 4. Cattle must meet the height requirement of 47" or less measured at the hip. This measurement will be to the best of the ability of the staff in charge of this task. Any discrepancy is subject to re-measurement, the final decision is that of the show management.
- 5. Must pre-enter by Friday, August 23 and show during regular beef show.

Contestants must be 14 - 19 years of age to participate in the junior division. Adult division will be all others. Junior entrants must have a minor release form signed by parent or guardian. Forms are available at OSU Extension Office. Contest will consist of two parts:

A written test and a driving test.

Awards will be presented for winners in both age divisions.

POULTRY AND RABBITS

Due to H5N1 avian flu, check to see if poultry can be allowed on fairgrounds before bringing to show.

- All breeds and varieties listed in the latest edition of the American Standard of Perfection are eligible to be shown and will be judged by comparison using the Standard of Perfection.
- Rabbits and Poultry will not stay at the fair, they must be entered by 5:30pm and will be judged at 6:00pm, then released on Friday. Bring in cages.
- Each exhibitor may show a total of 8 large chickens, 8 bantams, 6 water fowl, 6 turkeys and 4 rabbits. Pen of Three rabbits count as one (1) of the four (4) possible entries. However, Pen of Three cannot be used as single entries.
- 5. All birds must be judged as singles.
- 6. All birds must be true to color—no paint, dyes, or oils.
- All entries and awards in this department shall be subject to the General Regulations.

COPY WRITTEN MATERIAL AND REFERENCING SOURCES

All 4-H exhibits should be the original work of the 4-H member. When information is taken from books, publications, magazines, or from the internet it should be expressed in the 4-H members own words. The 4-H member must reference the source of the information by using an asterisk (*) or a number (if more than one) and name the actual source at the end or bottom of paper, poster or educational display following an asterisk or corresponding number in text.

No copyrighted or trademark protected be readable from at least 10 ft. away. written or visual material (pictures, photos, drawings, illustrations, etc.) should be used from books, magazines, publications, professional photographers, or from the internet without permission from the original creator.

If 4-H'er applies for and is granted permission to use a copyrighted or trademark protected item, a copy of the permission form or letter needs to be attached to the back of the exhibit and properly cited with an asterisk (*) or number.

If an item (picture, photo drawing, illustration, etc.) that is not protected is used its source must be cited and referenced by using an asterisk (*) or number and the source information placed at the end or bottom of paper, poster, or educational display, following an asterisk or corresponding number.

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

All educational displays must have stable, freestanding backs with sides attached. This includes Sec. 4301 and educational displays in specific project areas. Size requirements for all display board is 36" x 48". Educational displays must be 3-dimensional. Note: The sizes indicated in specific classes is the maximum table space allowed when sides are extended.

Do not include valuables, food items that will spoil or potentially harmful products (such as aspirin, cleaning products, chemicals, etc.) in any educational display. Neither the Oklahoma State Fair, or Tulsa State Fair, nor the 4-H Program can accept for loss of responsibility valuables. Potentially harmful products will be discarded. Text of displays should be readable from at least 10 ft. away.

POSTERS

For display purposes, exhibitors are encouraged to laminate all posters or cover them with clear plastic film. Posters must be signed and dated on the back with a permanent marker before laminating. If not marked the judging committee may mark or punch. All posters must be flat (no 3dimensional posters). Text of posters should

SIGNING AND DATING **EXHIBITS**

Exhibits should be permanently signed and dated, in an inconspicuous location, if material permits. Some exhibits that should be signed and dated are posters, most expressive arts and crafts including fine art, ceramics, woodworking and woodcrafts, herbarium cards, seed boards, forestry exhibits and model rocketry. Judge or Judging Committee may perma-

nently mark exhibit with fair and year (for example: OKC Fair 2017), if not signed and dated. Effort will be made to mark it in an inconspicuous place.

SECTION 4300 4-H POSTER-ART EXHIBIT **GUIDELINES**

Poster must be constructed on poster board 14" x 22" (1/2 of a poster board). They may be horizontal or vertical. Poster may be produced by any medium - watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, collage, computer, etc. — Posters must be flat. Do not use three-dimensional pieces on posters. Posters will be judged on (1) educational idea portrayed, (2) public appeal, and (3) creative and original ability presented.

Copyrighted or trademarked cartoon characters or other designs must not be used due to copyright restrictions. For display purposes, exhibitors are encouraged to laminate or cover all posters with clear plastic film.

Each county is limited to one poster per class. Individual 4-H member is restricted to those exhibits designed for his or her grade group.

The 4-H member's name, grade before September 1, and county should be on the back of the poster in the upper left hand corner. All exhibitors must be at least 8 years old AND in the 3rd grade by September 1, 2020.

There will be no solid dividers between booths, use lightweight materials for ease in transporting. Display must be free-standing.

Models, photographs, posters or other means for display may be used. Displays may be prepared by an individual or group from a Criteria for judging will be (1) effectiveness of the (2) appropriateness to the theme, (3) interest and attractiveness to the public.

Display must focus on ONE of the following and be suitable for display at a local business during National 4 -H Week or at another time.

- Promotion of a specific 4-H project, member recruitment, current youth issue, event, etc.
- Community Service.
- Theme "Find your spark in 4-H"

All exhibitors must be at least 8 years old AND in 3rd

SECTION 4302 4-H PHOTOGRAPHY

These exhibits consist of photos taken by the individual exhibitors. A photo can be entered only one year. Individuals can exhibit in only one Level, and may enter only one exhibit per class in that level. All Grades within each level are before September 1 of the current calendar year.

DIGITAL PHOTOS may be entered. Adjustments to digital photographs are limited to color and contrast adjustments, cropping, gray scaling, exposure adjustments, and red eye reduction (with the 4. exception of classes 25 – 28).

PRINTS: Black and white or color prints may be exhibited. Prints must be no smaller than "4 x 6" and no larger than 5" x 7" (except when panoramic prints are used) for all classes, except classes 5, 10, 14, 18, and 22 where prints may be up to 8" x 10". **Prints should be printed on photo-quality paper (not copy paper). Print quality is taken into consideration by the Judges. Photos will be disqualified if in a frame.**

TITLES, CAPTIONS AND OTHER REQUIRED INFORMATION: On the front of the board there must be a title (i.e. My Trip to the Zoo, or My Favorite Photo) and each photo must have a caption giving the viewer more information about the photograph. The tile should not be the class description but rather a description of the subject of the photos. The back of each board must include the exhibitor's name, county, number of years in the 4-H photography project.

BOARDS: Prints must be securely attached to the surface of a single **black or white** (not colored) poster board, foam core, or mat board. Photos will be disqualified if on regular printing paper or cardstock. No double matting, use of multiple layers or more than one color. The entire print must be seen and cannot be masked in any way. Boards must be 14" x 14" for all classes. Awards: Ribbons will be placed on the top ten (10). Premiums will be paid on the top

Rubber Band-Powered Vehicle Design Challenge

Design a wheel-driven vehicle, powered only by one rubber band (size #64 approx. 1/4" wide by 31/2" long by 1/32" thick.), which will transport a one-pound "load" (box of baking soda approx. size: 31/2" x 41/2" x 2") at least 9 feet (on a smooth flat floor) while remaining within the boundaries of a 3 ft. wide parallel track (marked off with masking tape). Speed is not a criteria.

There are no restrictions on materials, size, weight or number of wheels. However, the only energy source permitted is the elastic energy of one rubber band. Commercially assembled vehicles are NOT permitted. However, commercially manufactured components may be used as parts of the vehicle. The vehicle must be self-starting (i.e., no pushing, external power starts, etc.).

Propulsion of the vehicle must be through the wheels (i.e., no propellers, no launching mechanism). Transferring the energy of the rubber band to wheels via gears, fly wheels, etc., is encourages. No remotecontrol devices are permitted.

A journal or engineering notebook should be included to describe the creation, purpose and function of the device. Explain how you built and tested your vehicle and if you made any modifications. Chart or graph collected data and explain how you measured improvements in your engineering notebook or journal.

Displays without reports will be judged accordingly. Displays with reports will be placed above those missing reports.

Click Sample Technique Cards to find instruction for many of the techniques noted int the skill sheets (i.e. facings, zippers, hems, fasteners, etc.). Instruction Sheets for the projects can be found at: https://4h.okstate.edu/projects/ design-and-contruction/project-guidesheets.html. Fair exhibits have been carefully selected and directed for members to investigate and learn specific skills/ information and to demonstrate mastery of these skills/information. The endproduct/exhibit is being evaluated on the skills "learned/mastered." The skill sheet serves as the member's "personal reflection" and communicates to the judge what was learned. Why is this important? Because in 4-H, the reflection and application of what was learned is more important than the end product/exhibit. The skill sheet is to be used as a planning tool. It is important that each 4-H member take responsibility for the life skill of "learning to learn." This may require members, leaders and educators to look up terms and learn techniques as part of the educational process. Resources, instructions and project guides are posted online. Members are encouraged to seek out other valid resources which teach proper technique and knowledge in the areas of design and construction.

General Skills to be mastered in project/ product in ADC, IDC and HTDC:

- •Structural Design: Construction technique, size, form, color and texture suited to the materials and product end use.
- •Elements of Design: The finished product illustrates the member is learning or "mastering" the basic elements of design line, shape or form, texture, color, and space.
- •Principles of Design: The finished product illustrates an awareness and application of the principles of harmony, proportion, balance, rhythm and emphasis adding dimension, interest and/or appeal to the finished product.
- •Surface Design: Any lines, shapes, colors, textures, or materials applied to the product or item design that creates an emotional or personal quality, individuality and creative expression without disturbing initial/end purpose. Design is that "something" which makes the item unique to the individual designer.

Reports/Descriptions/Expense Sheet/etc. — Exhibits requiring a report/description/expense sheet of any kind, can be typed or neatly/legible hand written. Report should be one-two pages. If typed, it must be double spaced using a minimum of 12-point font. Report MUST be SECURELY attached to the exhibit. A county may enter 1 exhibit in each class. A 4-H member may enter 1 exhibit per class.

HOBBIES/TEXTILE DESIGN AND CON-STRUCTION - (HTDC)

HTDC projects are made from a textile product created by the exhibitor, unless otherwise stated. A textile is a flexible material made of fiber/thread/yarn. Textiles are formed with various methods including weaving, knitting, crocheting, knotting or felting. Other words for textiles are cloth and fabric.

Grades 3-6 - Review section 4306 general instructions. Project must have at least two (2) skills/techniques identified as appropriate for the ADC Level 1 or Level 2 project work. Some classes have specific skills/ 46. techniques which must be incorporated into the exhibit. See sample technique cards for some of the HTDC techniques.

- 42. Simple Sewn Stuffed animal, doll or puppet with both hand and machine stitching techniques. Focused on showing technique mastery/what was learned constructing the finished product.
- 43. Decorative Textile Technique: Skill technique(s) being mastered/learned screen printing, transfer printing, fabric pens, tie dye, batik, stenciling, block printing or a similar method applied to a textile foundation such as a piece of clothing, fashion accessory or home décor purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Any skill technique listed in classes 44-47 are not to be exhibited in this class. Focus is on the 1) mastery of one or more decorative textile technique, 2) creativity, and 3) mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design.
- 44. **Textile Fabric Creation:** Skill technique

- (s) being mastered/learned weaving (beading or textile), latchhook, braiding, macramé, knitting, crochet, felting, basket weaving or a combination of one of these techniques to create a textile. "Textile" defined as any woven, looped or felted thread or fibre. Focus is on 1) the mastery of one or more defined textile technique(s) used to complete a finished product 2) creativity and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design. Examples: toy/game (rug for doll house, doll, ball, etc.), home décor (doily, table scarf, pillow, coaster, wall hanging, plant hanger, small basket, linen - dish cloth, scrub, towel, pillow cover, etc.), clothing/fashion accessory (hat, scarf, purse/bag, jewelry, etc.) or similar small item. Any skill technique listed in classes 43, 45-48 are not to be exhibited in this class.
- 45. Needle Art by Hand: Skill technique(s) being mastered/learned hand embroidery, counted cross-stitch, needlepoint, crewel embroidery, needle punch or smocking applied to towel, pillowcase, garment, home accessory. Pictures must be framed. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Focus is on 1) the mastery of one or more "hand" needle art technique(s), 2) creativity, and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design.
 - Needle Art by Machine: Simple machine embroidery, cross stitch/decorative stitches, or applique applied to small decorative items, home accessories, towel, pillowcase, garment, picture, flag, banner, windsock, etc. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Focused on 1) the mastery of machine created needle art techniques, 2) creativity, and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design. NO full size quilts.
 - 7. Machine Pieced or Appliquéd Item

 —Skill technique(s) being mastered/
 learned is machine piecing and/or applique in the creation of a "textile/fabric.

 From the piece, design and construct
 apparel, fashion accessory, or home décor item. Focus is on 1) the mastery of
 one or more "machine pieced or appliqued technique(s)", 2) creativity, and
 3) master of the use of the elements and
 principles of design.

Repurposed Textile Creation: Item made from repurposed textile material/ product which can be worn/carried or used in the home. MUST include before and after (a picture being worn or displayed, showing how it was designed to fit room décor) photos, a description of the process - inspiration/design process, who it was made for, why the need, any special considerations, or any other pertinent information supporting the finished product. Focused on 1) appropriate use of repurposed textile. 2) quality of end product, 3) creativity, and 4) application of the elements and 52. principles of design. Attach See Recycle and Redesign instruction sheet.

Grades 7-12 - Review section 4306 general instructions. Project must have at least two (4) skills/techniques identified as appropriate for the ADC Level 3 or Level 4 project work. Some classes have specific skills/techniques which must be incorporated into the exhibit. See sample technique cards for some of the HTDC techniques.

- 49. Stuffed animal, doll or puppet with a minimum of two (2) hand and two (2) machine sewing techniques (i.e., embroidered/appliqued/textile painted facial features, hair constructed from 53. yarn/floss/fur, movable parts (arm, mouth, legs, etc.), use of fake fur, or any other similar combination of techniques showing mastery of skill/technique applied to the finished product.
- **Decorative Textile Technique:** Create a 50. piece of fabric using two (2) or more decorative textile techniques described in class 43. From the piece of fabric, design and construct apparel, fashion accessory, or home décor item. Any skill technique listed in classes 51-56 are not to be exhibited in this class. Focus is on the 1) mastery of technique, 2) the creative and appropriate blending of two or more decorative textile techniques, 3) the fabric/trim fittingly showcased in a finished product, and 4) master of the use of the elements and principles of design.
- 51. Textile Fabric Creation: Design and construction of an original textile [fabric or trim] using at least two (2) techniques described in class 45.

Additional techniques might include but are not limited to hand spinning, cotton linter, and tatting. From the textile fabric, design and construct apparel, fashion accessory, or home décor item. Focus is on 1) the mastery of two or more textile technique(s) used to produce a textile, 2) creative and appropriate use of the "textile" in finished product, and 3) mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design. Any skill technique listed in classes 50, 52-56 are not to be exhibited in this class.

- Needle Art by Hand: Two (2) or more of these "hand" technique(s). Techniques include but not limited to embroidery [floss, yarn (crewel) or ribbon], cross-stitch, needlepoint, needle punch, smocking, Trapunto quilting, hand quilting, or similar techniques. Base/ foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Exhibit must be a finished product, ready to display/use. Focus is on 1) the mastery of two or more "hand" needle art technique(s), 2) creativity, and 3) a mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design. This class is not intended for pieced quilts which do not fit the criteria described. A pieced quilt would be exhibited in class 54 or 55.
- Needle Art by Machine: Two (2) or more of these "machine" techniques: original free motion embroidery/thread painting, "modified" commercial/ software-based embroidery design (must describe modification(s) on skill mastery sheet), Trapunto quilting, quilting, applique, or other advanced needle art technique(s) applied to clothing, fashion accessory or home/school/office décor. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Focus is on 1) the mastery of two or more "machine" created needle art techniques, 2) creativity, and 3) a mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design. This class is not intended for pieced quilts which do not fit the criteria described. A pieced quilt would be exhibited as class 54 and 55.

- 54. Hand Pieced and/or Hand Appliquéd 58. Item finished with Hand quilting. Piecing and/or applique and quilting MUST have been done by hand, not by machine. Examples might include picture or wall art, pillow, bag, doll quilt, table runner, lap robe, etc. Focus is on1) the mastery of "hand work," 2) creativity and 3) the mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design.
- Machine Pieced and/or Machine Appliquéd Item finished with Machine Quilting. Quilting must be done by the exhibitor. Examples might include picture or wall art, pillow, bag, doll quilt, lap robe, table runner, etc. Focus is on 1) the mastery of one or more "machine pieced or appliqued technique(s)," 2) creativity, and 3) mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design.
 - **Repurposed Textile Creation:** Item made from repurposed textile material/ product which can be worn, used in the home, at school, in the office, on the job, car/boat/vehicle, etc. MUST in- 1. clude before and after (a picture being worn or displayed, showing how it was designed to fit room décor) photos, a description of the process - inspiration/ design process, who it was made for, why the need, any special considerations, or any other pertinent information supporting the finished product. Focused on 1) appropriate selection of textile, 2) appropriate construction techniques for end use, 3) creativity, and 4) the use of the elements and principles of design. See Recycle and Redesign instruction sheet.

All Grades - HTDC

57. Hobbies and Textiles Design Project Portfolio: A portfolio is a great record keeping tool. It will be a valuable source for ideas and future projects, a place to share any project work done in HTDC and provide a place to show samples of new techniques or knowledge explored in HTDC. It is a notebook with three (3) sections – 1) Projects/Products, 2) Sample Technique Pages and 3) Creative Inspirations and Ideas. See Design Portfolio instructions. All Portfolios, regardless of grade, will be judged together.

Quilts of Valor Community Service — Group or individually constructed quilt, constructed for the express purpose of being presented to a Veteran as part of the Quilts of Valor program. When available, attach the presentation script used in the Awards Ceremony or a copy of the report submitted to Quilts of Valor (https://www.qovf.org/take-action/report-a-quilt-of-valor-award/). Pictures of the presentation welcome. Be sure to have the veteran's approval to use their picture for display.

SECTION 4307 BABYSITTING/CHILD CARE

Refer to member and leader guides for ideas. A county may enter one exhibit in each class. Individual 4-H member can enter one exhibit per class in appropriate grade group. Please reference the State 4-H Website https://4-hmilitarypartnerships.org/resources/educatorresources/youth-babysitting for more information.

Junior (Grades 3-7)

- Baby Book Any practical size, minimum of 5 pages covering at least 9-10 months of development. Includes photographs, drawings mementos, and comments on developmental milestones. Must be clear that 4-H'er has contributed development information to child book. Baby books prepared earlier by parents may not be entered unless 4-H'er reworks the information. Handwriting should be the youth preparing exhibit not an adult. See Unit One, page 13. Do not confuse with class 4, Children's Book.
- 2. . Puzzles Help Children Learn Any size. Two (2) puzzles developmentally appropriate for children at two distinct Grades and ability levels. Each puzzle must have its own storage container. Puzzles must be sturdy and covered so they can be cleaned with damp cloth. Describe the child for whom the puzzle would be appropriate by giving child's Grades, interest, and ability. should be suitable for either boys or girls. Do not indicate that a puzzle is for boys or girls only. See Unit One, page 13. Commercially made puzzles are not eligible.

3. Child Care Poster

Must be 14" x 22" and must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Judging committee may mark or punch if not marked. Text of poster should be visible for at least 10 ft. away. Choose one of these topics to develop poster: Behavior and Guidance--Include pictures and fact about child development. (See Unit One, pages 14-15 and No. 706); Safety Risks and Procedures--include common safety risks that a babysitter needs to be aware of and procedures to address the safety issue (See No. 575, pages 4-7 Unit 1, pages 16-17; Unit 2, pages 28-29; 4-H Army Child & Youth Services Babysitting Student Guide, pages 25-44); ages and Stages of Development (No 575, page 10, 4-H Army Child & Youth Services Babysitting Student Guide, pages 49-50)

4. Basic First Aid Kit

Create a basic first aid kit from scratch (not a purchased kit) that includes the basic supplies to take care of small accidents such as bumps, scrapes, stings, and sprains. Include an emergency contact list in the first aid kit that includes but is not limited to: Emergency numbers for police, fire department, poison control, veterinarian, etc. Include a supply list and the cost to put the kit together. The kit should be in a container with a lid or zipper closure. Make sure there is a label on the kit that identifies it as a "First Aid Kit." See 4-H Army Child & Youth Services Babysitting Student Guide, pages 37-41)

Seniors (Grades 8-12)

5. Children's Book

Written, illustrated and constructed by 4-H'er. May be written for a specific with text relating to that child or for children of certain Grades range. Indicate appropriate Grades range. Construction paper, computer print out, cloth or poster board may be used. Illustrations may be drawn, photographs, appliqués, magazine pictures or reassembled from other books. See no. 707, Books for Children. Do not confuse with Class 1, Baby Book.

6. Surprise Suitcase

Fill suitcase with homemade or store bought items for children you baby-sit. Could include books, puzzles, games, play dough, balls, costumes. Indicate appropriate Grades child to use each item. Include records of how children have responded to materials. Package in suitcase that can be taken to

home. See No. 722, Child Care Kit. May include commercial puzzles. Contents need to be in a suitcase or a container with a lid.

7. Create a Game

Create a board game or card game to teach a specific topic to a child. Examples might include but are not limited to: Hygiene practices, exercise and fitness, safety, etc. Game boards must be 14" x 22" and must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Make sure to laminate game boards, cards or any pieces made of paper so that they are durable. Include written instructions of the rules of the game. Note in the instructions the Grades appropriateness of the game.

HEALTH/LIFESTYLE EDUCATION DIVISION SECTION 4308 4-H FOOD SCIENCE & NUTRITION FAIR

Individual 4-H members can enter one exhibit per class, but are restricted to those exhibits designed for his/her grade group. Educational exhibits must fit 3' x 4' (width x depth) space, with sides extended. Exhibits must be free standing with sides attached. Poster must be constructed on poster board 14" x 22". Posters and displays must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Judging committee may mark or punch if not marked.

Text of posters and displays should be readable from at least 10ft. away.

Criteria for evaluating educational displays and posters include:

Originality of Idea - 20 points Educational Value - 50 points Display Value - 30 points

All food products must be on a paper plate and in a sealed plastic bag. The superintendent will only exhibit a slice of cake or bread and one cookie, muffin or roll of all exhibits and will dispose of all excess food.

4-H'ers may use recipes indicated in the food science manuals or any other recipe that fits the exhibit requirements. Cakes must be made from scratch using shortening mixing method (no angel food or chiffon-type). Bread machines may be used for the bread exhibits but bread must be made from scratch - no mixes.

Dried foods should be exhibited in a sealed, plastic sandwich bag. Canned foods should be placed in colorless, standard canning jars such as those made by Kerr, Ball, etc., and properly sealed with two piece lids (no paraffin on jams and jellies). Other types of jars will be rejected. Judges will remove the screw-bands at time of judging. should be neat and plainly written. Jars of jams and jellies being considered for ribbons may be evaluated for taste in addition to traditional attributes. Only the top five (5) exhibits in each food preparation class will sauce. be displayed. All other exhibits may be picked up after judging is complete. Any exhibit not picked up the day of judging will be disposed of by fair officials.

FOOD PREPARATION EXHIBITS

LEVEL TWO Grades 3-5

- 1. Three (3) Muffins
- 2. Three (3) Rolled Biscuits
- 3. Three (3) Baked Drop Cookies (no shaped cookies such as snicker doodle or peanut butter)

LEVEL THREE Grades 6-8

- One-half loaf of any yeast bread, not a sweet or sourdough, made by hand or in a bread machine.
- 5. Three (3) yeast cinnamon rolls (no icing)
- 6. Three (3) rolled sugar-type cookies (no icing; no ginerbread recipes)

LEVEL FOUR Grades 9-12

- One-half loaf or portion of breads from another culture. Include a one page story on how this bread fits into that culture and its nutritional contribution.
- 8. One-half of one 8" layer cake, un-iced (no angel food or chiffon)
- Two-crust fruit pie— 9" or 10" disposable pie pan. Crust and filling must be made by exhibitor.

FOOD PRESERVATION EXHIBITS

(Jar rings should be left on for display. Home canned food entries to be presented in standard jars made for home canning, with a raised pattern or lettering, clear, uncolored glass and two piece lids.)

LEVEL TWO Grades 3-5

- 10. One pint or half pint jar of jam or jelly processed in boiling water canner.11. Two pieces of fruit leather
- 12. One pint or half pint of salsa/picante

LEVEL THREE

Grades 6-8

- 13. One pint jar cucumber pickles or vegetable relish
- 14. One pint or quart of any single canned fruit (not pickled).
- 15. Dried Fruit (1/2 cup of a single dried fruit) Display in a sealed plastic sandwich/ freezer bag.

LEVEL FOUR Grades 9-12

- 16. One pint or quart jar pressure canned vegetables (no tomatoes or pickles)
- 17. One quart or one pint jar of plain canned tomatoes.
- Dried vegetable (1/2 cup of single dried vegetable). Display in a sealed plastic sandwich/freezer bag.

4-H FOOD SCIENCE & NUTRITION POSTER & EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

Posters and Educational Displays must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Judging committee may mark or punch if not marked. SECTION 4310 4-H POSTMARK

This exhibit consists of postmarks, not illustrated. All stamps. Exhibits may be postmarks must be mounted on either 8 1/2" x 11" note paper or photo album page of any color in a binder. All entries are limited to thirty (30) page for the collection, plus an additional page for the objective of the collection. Plastic cover page are acceptable to protect the mounts. Any class may be illustrated. The criteria for judging will be: (1) Appearance and neatness; (2) readability; (3) material relates to chosen topic; (4) brief written description telling purpose or objective of your collection.

NOTE: Metered postage marks must not be used in non-metered class exhibits and non-metered postmarks in metered classes.

Collections from a commercial source are not eligible for exhibit (i.e. through a postal society membership.) At least one-third of the postmarks in any collection must have been added during the current project year. All entries must be clearly marked on the front cover or inside the front cover with the member's name and county.

4-H'ers may enter one exhibit per class in their grade group.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY DIVISION SECTION 4311

4-H ELECTRIC EXHIBIT

All exhibits must illustrate applications and utilize electrical energy. The exhibit must have been constructed by the exhibitor during the year exhibited and must meet electrical safety standards. All exhibits, except lamps will be judged on electrical wiring and connections, electrical components, usefulness of exhibit, working condition, complexity and design, appearance,

originality, workmanship and safety. Lamps will be judged as described for each class. A 4-H member can have only one (1) exhibit in each class. Exhibits should be permanently signed and dated on the bottom or in an inconspicuous location. If not marked judges may mark or punch.

All exhibitors must be at least 8 years AND in 3rd grade by September 1, 2020.

Classes:

- Electric projects (Grades3-7) Entries to include electromagnets, motors, buzzers and direct current circuit boards.
- Kit Lamps (Kit Construction) All Grades - Electrical wiring and connections, light source, and suitability as a reading lamp will be judged. Lamps can be floor, desk or wall models.
- 3. **Original Lamps** All Grades Originality, workmanship, electrical wiring and connections, light source, and suitability as a reading lamp will be judged. Lamps can be floor, desk or wall models (no kits).
- Educational poster on careers in the electrical field – (all grades) – Poster must be 14" x 22"
- 5. Electric and Electronic Circuits Grades 3-7 The exhibit should be mounted on a board and clearly show all circuits. The exhibit should be operational and demonstrate a useful principle or be functional. The exhibit should include an explanation of the principal being demonstrated.
 - Electric and Electronic Circuits Grades 8-12. The exhibit should be mounted on a board and clearly show all circuits. The exhibit should be operational and demonstrate a useful principle or be functional. The exhibit should include an explanation of the principal being demonstrated.
- Exhibit—Grades 8-12. Exhibit demonstrating skill or knowledge such as wire sizing; proper wiring of an electrical cord plug, wall outlet, wall switch, 3 way switch, etc. The exhibit should include an explanation of the principal being demonstrated.
- Exhibit Grades 8-12. Exhibit of a wiring diagram for a home, other building, or electric supply system for a community.
- Electric Concept Poster Grades 3-7 –
 Poster (14" x 22") Exhibit showing a
 basic electric concept or explaining the
 proper use of electricity in modern life.

Electronics/Lighting Selection Poster -Grades 8-12 - Poster (14" x 22") Exhibit is on information that consumers might use in making a selection of any electronic devices such as computers, games, telephones, lighting fixtures, bulbs or other electronic device.

SECTION 4312 MODEL ROCKETRY

Posters must be 14" x 22". Exhibitors are encouraged to laminate all posters or cover them with clear plastic film. Display boards should be limited to a maximum of 2' x 3' and must have a single 1/4" hole drilled at the top center of board to allow for display. NO LIVE ROCKET ENGINES WILL BE ALLOWED IN ANY EXHIBIT. Text of posters or displays should be readable from at least 10 ft. away. *Homemade rockets could be dangerous to fly. Model rockets, posters, and displays should be permanently signed and dated in an inconspicuous location. If not marked the judging committee may mark or punch exhibits.

Attach a 3"x 5" index card to each rocket, explaining:

- Construction material, how constructed and goal of project.
- Year in project
- Grade of Member
- Whether or not made from kit
- Other pertinent information

A county can enter only one exhibit in each class. 4-H members can enter only one exhibit in each class.

Senior Division (Grades 8-12)

SECTION 4313 4-H WOOD SCIENCE AND **INDUSTRIAL ARTS**

The wood science exhibits should demonstrate a project experience which emphasizes the development of woodworking skills, such as: sawing, sanding, planning, of joints, neat use of fasteners (nails, screws, etc.), and careful application of finishes. Judging will focus on the evidence of these skills. These exhibits will consist of made by 4-H Club members the past year. The project is not limited to current project idea sheets. It must be proportional; functional: and include the same techniques as the listed classes.

SECTION 4314 SHOOTING SPORTS

No live ammunition, actual firearms or parts of firearm that could be reassembled should be included. Any manufactured part of a sporting arm may not be displayed. No knives, axes, etc. may be entered.

For exhibits other than posters, attach a 3x5 inch note card to the back of the exhibit describing the exhibit, what was done to create or prepare this exhibit and how the exhibit relates to the Shooting Sports Project.

The 4-H member's name, Grades, and county must be included with the exhibit. Exhibits deemed to be inappropriate will not be displayed. Exhibits suggested but not limited to posters, educational displays, journals, slings, quivers, gun stocks, decoys and equipment.

Exhibits suggested but not limited to posters, educational displays, journals, slings, quivers, gun stocks, decoys and equipment.

All exhibits will be judged on the basis of instructions and standards explained in the Oklahoma "501: 4-H Shooting Sports Exhibit Preparation Guidelines Leaders/Members #690 (1/2007) which is available through the County Extension Office and on the Oklahoma State 4-H Website https://4h.okstate.edu/projects/shootingsports-curriculum/site-files/docs/shootingsports-project-prep-guide-updated-logo.pdg. Posters must be 14"x 22". For display purposes, exhibitors are encouraged to laminate all posters or cover them with clear plastic film. Posters must be permanently signed and dated on the back. If not marked the judging committee may mark or punch. Posters may be horizontal or vertical. Text of poster should be readable from at least 10 ft. away. Educational display must be three dimensional should be mounted on a freestanding display board not to exceed 36" x 36" (width x depth) when the sides are extended for display.

Commercially available "Science Fair Presentation Boards" are recommended.

If you use text, pictures, drawings, artwork or other information not created by you in your exhibit you must cite the source.

Junior Division (Grades 3-7)

SECTION 4315 ENTOMOLOGY 4-H INSECT EXHIBITS

The exhibits in entomology are planned to build on prior experiences. A 4-H member may enter only one insect collection. All insects must be mounted on standard insect pins which can be purchased from the State 4-H Office. Each insect should be identified by their common name using the correct spelling. A typed master list indicating the scientific order and common name of each specimen should accompany the display. Exhibits in Classes 2 through 5 must be in insect display boxes measuring 19" x 16.5" x 3". This is the size of a Cornell University Drawer. These boxes can be purchased at http://www.bioquip.com/search/DispProduct.asp?pid=1012AM or made using the pattern available at https://4h.okstate.edu/events/okc-tulsa-state-fair/site-files/docs/entomology-exhibit-display-box.pdf.

Boxes that are not this size will be **DIS-QUALIFIED**. At least one-third of the specimens in any collection must have been collected during the current project year building upon your previous collections.

- 4. **Fourth Year** The fourth year exhibit shall consist of 75 adult insects (representing 12 orders) which are displayed in the insect display box as indicated above.
- 5. **Fifth Year** and Beyond The exhibit shall consist of 100 adult insects (representing 14 orders) which are displayed in the insect display box as indicated above. There is no limit on the number of years this class may be entered, if exhibit has additions or major modifications. your previous collections.

4-H HONEY EXHIBIT

Only one exhibit allowed in each class per individual.

Honey should be placed in colorless, onepint honey jars or standard, colorless onepint fruit iars

such as those made by Kerr, Ball, Mason, etc. Other types of jars will be rejected. Jar covers should be new if possible and should be screwed on tightly to prevent leakage. There should be 1/4"-1/2" air space below the lid.

Honey should be clear and free from foreign particles.

Chunk honey should be perfectly capped, free from stains, bee-bread and finger prints. Edges should be clean-cut, not ragged. One piece only in each jar; as wide as jar mouth will permit and long enough to extend from the bottom to the top without jamming. Labels should be neat and plainly written or printed and include: Name, Club, Type of Honey, and Month and Year collected.

SECTION 4316 4-H FORESTRY

A member may enter one exhibit per class but is restricted to only those exhibits designed for his or her grade group.

FÖRESTRY BOARDS AND EXHIBITS MUST BE SIGNED AND DATED ON THE BACK BY THE EXHIBITOR

Two holes 1/2 inch in diameter and 1 inch from the top should be drilled in wood boards to facilitate displaying the exhibit.

TREE LEAF EXHIBIT

PLEASE NOTE: Exhibit must conform to all requirements, including labeling & display requirements outlined in 4-H facts sheet #236 "Collecting and Exhibiting Tree Leaves" (revised 2007) https://4h.okstate.edu/projects/environmental-science/site-files/docs/forestry/collecting-and-exhibiting-tree-leaves.pdf

- 1. <u>Grades 3-5</u>. Collection of 10 leaves from trees native to Oklahoma (no introduced species). One specimen must be from a native evergreen -- pine or juniper. Include a twig & buds with each broadleaf specimen. Exhibit must be properly labeled and displayed on board 22" wide and 28" tall.
- 2. <u>Grades 6-8</u>. Collection of 15 leaf specimens, representing at least three of the five basic leaf types, from trees native to Oklahoma (no introduced species).

Two (2) specimens must be from native awl or scale-leaf evergreen—pine or juniper. Non-native species are acceptable only if they have been introduced for planting windbreaks and shelterbelts. Include a twig with buds with each broadleaf specimen. Exhibit must be properly labeled and displayed on board 28" tall and 44" wide.

3. Grades 9-12. Collection of 20 leaf specimens, representing four of the five basic leaf types, from trees native to Oklahoma.

Three (3) specimens must be from needle. scale or awl-leaf evergreens.

Species of pine not native to Oklahoma are acceptable if they have been introduced for planting windbreaks and shelterbelts. The palmate leaf sample must come from a native Oklahoma species.

WOOD SAMPLE EXHIBIT

Wood sample exhibits should conform to instructions outlined by grade group in Oklahoma 4-H Fact Sheet # 238 "Wood Sample Exhibits" (revised 2/2007). https://4h.okstate.edu/projects/ environmental-science/site-files/docs/ forestry/wood-sample-exhibits.pdf

4. **ALL GRADES** - The exhibit shall consist of eight (8) wood samples (four (4) HARD-WOODS AND four (4) SOFTWOODS) mounted on plywood 1/4" thick AND 22" wide X 20" high.

SECTION 4317 **GEOLOGY**

Any eligible 4-H member may participate in collecting, identifying and preparing a rock-mineral-fossil exhibit or preparing an energy and petroleum exhibit.

An Individual 4-H member can enter one exhibit per class.

Rock-Mineral-Fossil exhibitors should securely display their specimens in a box no larger than 24" X 24". Box can be wood, plastic or cardboard but have a method of covering the rocks, minerals and fossils. Each sample should be mounted or in a compartment and labeled in a neat, orderly manner. Labels should include common name, date, location found and mineral use. At least one -third of the specimens in any collection must have been added during the current project year.

CLASS

- Fifteen (15) different unpolished rocks. minerals, or fossils collected in Oklahoma
- Thirty (30) different unpolished rocks, 2. minerals, or fossils, including specimens of sedimentary, igneous and metamorphic.
- Self- Determined exhibit Education exhibit depicting some phase of geology, testing of minerals, polished rocks, etc. (Display should not exceed 24" x 24")

Energy/petroleum exhibits. Posters must be on 14" x 22" poster board. Each must be signed and dated on the back in permanent marker prior to laminating. Judging committee may mark or punch if not marked. Text of posters and displays should be readable from at least 10 ft. away. Displays should be self standing and not bigger that 3' x 4' (width x depth) when sides are extended.

Junior Division (Grades 3-5)

- 9. SECTION 4318 4-H WILDLIFE PROJECTS

Only one exhibit will be allowed in each class per individual. Individuals may enter only in their respective grade category.

SELF DETERMINED EXHIBITS - To encourage members to develop their learning projects, a self determined exhibit class is included in each category. For ideas and guidelines for exhibits, please see 4-H publication # 721 "4-H Wildlife Self Determined Projects" (revised 12/06) and 4H NREM 624 Creating a Wildlife Resource Map. Text of posters should be readable at least 10 ft. away. Include references for information. At least one reference must be from a source other than the internet.

All 4-H exhibits should be the original work of the 4-H member. When information is taken from books, publications, magazines, or from the internet it should be expressed in the 4-H members own words. The 4-H member must reference the source of the information by using an asterisk (*) or a number (if more than one) and name the actual source at the end or bottom of paper, poster or educational display following an asterisk or corresponding number in text.

No copyrighted or trademark protected written or visual material (pictures, photos, drawings, illustrations, etc.) should be used from books, magazines, publications or from the internet with-out permission from the original creator. If 4-H'er applies for and is granted permission to use a copyrighted or trademark protected item, a copy of the permission form or letter needs to be attached to the back of the exhibit and properly cited with an asterisk (*) or number.

All posters, resource maps, and displays must be permanently signed and dated on the back. If not marked, the judging committee may mark or punch. Text of posters

or educational displays should be readable from at least 10 feet away. All exhibits on boards must have hangers. Eye screws and wire preferred, no saw-toothed hangers.

OKLAHOMA WILDLIFE

Exhibits entered in this section should relate to a specific category of game or non-game animals or birds.

Junior (Grades 3-7)

- Scrapbook of Oklahoma Wildlife (cutouts, pictures or drawings) of at least five (5) mammals, five (5) birds and five (5) reptiles or amphibians. Give common name and what habitat they can be found in. Common names should be specific (i.e. black rat snake, pygmy rattlesnake, etc.)

Prints must be no smaller than 3.5 inch x 5 inch and no larger than 5 inch x 7 inch. Digital photos may not be manipulated or altered except for color and contrast adjustments, cropping, exposure adjustments, and red eye reduction. Prints must be securely attached to the surface of a poster board or mat board. No double matting, use of multiple layers or more than one color. The entire print must be seen and cannot be masked in any way. Boards must be no larger than 10" x 10". Captions are optional, but not required. Photos are to be taken by the exhibitor

The exhibit should provide information about one phase of the peanut industry such as history, use, production, processing, or importance. The exhibit should increase the public awareness of the importance and impact of the specific sector of the peanut industry selected. The notebook should include any involvement the exhibitor has had with teaching others, giving talks or demonstrations, preparing peanut foods, planning programs, producing peanuts, etc. The notebook may be typed or handwritten and should include pictures.

Criteria for judging: 30 points Completeness of educational lesson, 30 points Public ap-

peal, 40 points notebook. Ribbons will be placed on the top ten (10) in each class.

The cards should be enclosed in a notebook or binder. Each specimen should be covered with a transparent plastic or similar covering to protect it from damage. No leaf should be more than 3 years old and at least one-third of the specimens must have been collected during the current project year. Instructions for collecting and pressing are available in the OSU Extension Center.

Terrariums should feature either woodland or tropical plants, and feature at least 3 different species of plants. Terrariums must be completely covered at all times.

Terrariums containing succulents will be disqualified; succulents belong in dish gardens.

80% living plant material. Dish Gardens should feature at least three different species of plants.

PECAN INFORMATION EXHIBIT

- Purpose: To promote the benefits of enrolling in Agricultural Education and joining FFA. Booths will be of the type that could be used in a variety of settings, such as FFA Week booths, shopping center displays, local fair, etc.
- 2. Booth will consist of a 6' by 8' tabletop display. The table must be 28" to 32" in height and 28" to 32" wide. The display board will be constructed of a 4' x 8' sheet of 1/2" or 5/8" material. The board is to be cut and hinged to consist of two, 2' wings and a 4' center back.
- 3. The back side of the display board is to be painted dark blue.
- 4. Each chapter is required to bring their own 6' or 8' table that is 28" to 32" in height and 28" to 32" in width.

The chapter is responsible for the top of the table and the skirting of the table 6' wide and from the top of the table to the floor. Electrical outlets are provided.

- 5. The current National FFA theme must be utilized. The Local Chapter name must be displayed.
- 6. Booth space will be assigned by the Superintendent upon arrival. Booths not meeting requirements nor following guidelines (size, theme, division, etc.) may be disqualified from the competition and/or removed from display area.

- 7. Booths will be divided into two divisions. The **Mechanical Division** will include booths with a moving display involving powered devices. Examples may include water wheels, fans, rotating devices, talking booths and electronic devices. The **Non-Mechanical Division** includes booths with no powered displays. Non-mechanical booths may include lights that do not flash, move, or rotate. Chapters can enter in one division only.

The exhibitor's name and address must be placed on the back of the board in addition to the entry tag. Displays will be judged on choice of species; quality of samples (green, color, leafiness, dryness and stage maturity); neatness and arrangement of samples in general appearance of display: and correctness and readability of labels. Entries which are found to be identical as a result of group preparation will be disqualified.

CARDS MUST BE **DATED AND NUMBERED.** Leaf specimens should be collected and prepared for exhibit during the same year they are being entered for judging. There must be a table of contents in the front of the book. Name and chapter must appear on the inside back cover. An article can be shown only once at the county/state fair, and must have been constructed during the previous two (2) school years. articles must be clean and in a presentable condition even though they may have been used during the year. Pictures showing operation of the project may be displayed with the exhibit. exhibit shall have an Ag Mechanics card attached showing chapter name, individual ownership, a detailed bill of materials with cost, and a suggested retail price. These signs will be provided by State Office. Entries will be judged on the basis of workmanship, structure and design, practicability, safety, and materials used. Exhibits in Class 7, "Reconditioned Machinery & Equipment," must be factory manufactured equipment that has been reconditioned in the Ag Shop. (It is recommended 1 to 3 photographs of the project before start of restoration be included with the Ag Mechanics card that is attached to the exhibit.) Exhibits in Class 13 and 14 "Small Projects," should be less than 2 ft. in length or less than 20 lbs. in weight. All exhibits to be displayed in a safe manner.

<u>DIVISION 5423</u> AGRISCIENCE PROJECT DISPLAY

The purpose of the Agriscience Project Display is to provide an opportunity for individual FFA members to compete in a science fair related to agriculture. The Division is open to all FFA members who have developed a project based on the application of scientific principles and emerging technologies in agriculture. This will serve as the pre-convention workout for FFA members whose projects will be going to the National FFA Convention AgriScience Fair competition. Participants are expected to observe the National FFA Code of Ethics and the proper use of the FFA jacket during the AgriScience Fair. Official dress is required.

DISPLAY REQUIREMENTS:

Each exhibit should include information relevant to the study. All projects must have the following information attached to the exhibit:

☐ Name of AgriScience fair participant(s) responsible for developing the project.

- ☐ Chapter name, state
- ☐ Title of category
- ☐ Division (1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6)

AgriScience fair participant(s display shows the results of the study utilizing a display board not to exceed the dimensions of 36" high (from top of table to top of display), 48" width and 30" deep (the distance from front to back).

The display must consist of a stable, free standing display board on the provided table top not to exceed the sizes outlined above. The student researcher(s) may also have the log book and up to five (5) copies of the written report as part of the display.
