Sportsmanship in equestrian sports

Why is sportsmanship often a problem in competitive events? Surely, we can all agree on the importance of being kind and nice to one another. What has happened over the past several years? Has social media and current reality programming just reinforced the idea that bad behavior is socially acceptable or gets more attention? Or is there something else going on in a high-pressure environment?

Positive youth development is often coupled with competition as a motivator for the time and devotion needed for a project. Unfortunately, the potential for negative behavior is quite high, said Kris Hiney, Oklahoma State University Extension equine specialist.

"Showing horses is definitely a sport activity with winners and, therefore, losers," Hiney said. "Sports themselves are often viewed as combative – we go to battle with the other team. So how do we compete and grow in life skills in these situations?"

Striving for intentional good behavior should be a focus of equine competitive activities. Adult leaders need to both teach and reward observation of positive competitive behavior.

There are four essential elements of good sportsmanship in horse activities:

- Respect for horses
- Respect for opponents
- Respect for the "game"
- Respect for others

Respect for horses: Having respect for our horse partners of

course means managing their physical needs, such as healthcare and nutrition. Healthcare can include making sure the horse is vaccinated and the 4-H'er is practicing good biosecurity skills in order to not spread disease to fellow competitors. Fair training practices are also essential. The horse should have the opportunity to respond how it has been previously trained to do so, and after the horse performs that behavior, leave them alone! Don't drill or punish the horse for suddenly raised expectations due to a competition environment. The horses didn't sign up for competition or know what the goal and desire of their youth showman. Treat them as the true partner they are, and reward and recognize their efforts.

Respect for opponents: Youth should be rewarded for seeking excellence with fellow competitors, not just the opportunity to place higher. Taking joy in winning against clearly unequal levels of competition isn't the goal. Appreciate others' performances and strive for that excellence yourself. Simple acts of congratulating fellow youth for showing good horsemanship skills should take place at every event.

Respect for the game: This essentially means following the rules of the game. There's no glory in cheating. Trying one's best is key. Giving up, creating more problems, blaming others or the horse for one's own mistakes is not good sportsmanship. Also, respecting the purpose of 4-H horse events important. The goal of 4-H is positive (Continue on Page 2)

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youth development, where the emphasis is on the youth, not the horse. At the end of the day, we want the youth to be better and gain life skills.

Respect for others: It takes a tremendous amount of time and effort for judges, show managers, trainers, coaches and leaders to put on these events. 4-H is unique in that it is heavily dependent on volunteers who give their time freely and willingly. Treating them poorly can quickly lead them to find better things to do with their free time. Many of the staff running horse shows do not do this professionally or even compete with horses themselves.

"Disappointment will always be part of competition, but how you handle it is important," Hiney said. "It is okay to get mad or need some time to blow off steam, but there is a time and place. Give yourself 5-10 minutes, but don't take it out on the horse, your family or your friends. Be sure to congratulate others, no matter your placings. And always accept awards graciously."

Both adults and youth volunteer leaders help develop these skills by being good role models, and it doesn't always come easily in high pressure situations. Practice at home and in public so it becomes routine. Build feelings of camaraderie and teamwork. Give awards for those that exemplify good sportsmanship and praise those that show evidence of hard work, not just who comes out on top. As parents and leaders, having clear guidelines and expectations for behavior is vital, as is following through with real consequences for unwanted behavior. Following an event, discuss examples of good and poor sportsmanship that were observed.

"Good sportsmanship extends beyond just the 4-Her themselves, but to their family, spectators, and 4-H volunteers. Sportsmanship and success are not always mutually inclusive. If you are harming your animal or others in pursuit of victory, it doesn't mean much," she said. "How do you want to be remembered by those watching your behaviors? Competition is about striving to try your best, challenge yourself and show the world the best example of you."

Dewey County Food Showdown May 24, 2023 Registration Due – May 19

The County Food Showdown contest will be held on May 24 at the fairgrounds in Taloga. The top two teams in each age division will qualify to go on to the district contest on June 9th.

Teams of up to three 4-H members will work together to prepare a dish of food and present it to the judge with an oral presentation.

- Cloverbuds (K-3rd grade) will follow a picture recipe to prepare a snack. No cooking or cutting.
- Jr. 4-H'ers (grades 3-5) will be provided with a simple recipe which they can adapt or add to, to prepare a dish.
- Intermediate 4-H'ers (grades 6-8) will receive two ingredients and some possible recipes. They may use one of the recipes or create their own but must use the secret ingredient to create a dish.
- Sr. 4-H'ers (grades 9-12) will receive four ingredients. They must use those four and may choose additional ingredients form the pantry. To created a dish.

Each team will bring a cooking kit too use, Contact the extension office for a list of the items to include in the cooking kit and for additional contest guidelines.



Dewey County Cupcake Wars May 31, 2023 at Fairgrounds Registration Due – May 19, 2023

The county cupcake wars contest will be held on May 31, 2023 at the fairgrounds in Taloga. The top teams in each age division will qualify to go on to the district contest on June 9, 2023.

Teams of 2-3 members will work together to create and display three cupcakes and present their exhibits to the judges.

- Teams will bring "naked" cupcakes, plain frosting and all supplies needed to decorate their cupcakes.
- Frosting will be tinted and put in bags during the contest.
- Fondant may be pre-tinted (before the contest).
- Only edible items may be used to decorate cupcakes.
- Teams will have 30 minutes to prepare their entry and clean up their area.
- May bring one picture of the item they plan to create. It must not have any writing or directions on the picture.
- Teams are allowed to bring their presentation scripts.
- Electricity will not be available at work stations. Keep this in mind when selecting your recipe.
- Practice food safety as you work.
- Presentation should include: introduction, creative dish name, two major nutrients, food preparation principles, food safety considerations.
- All team members must participate in the presentation.

The county fruit/vegetable sculpting/arrangements contest will be held on May 31, 2023 at the fairgrounds in Taloga. The top teams in each age division will qualify to go on to the district contest on June 9, 2023.

Teams of 2-3 members will work together to prepare a dish-sculpture or arrangement made of fruits and/or dish – sculpture or arrangement made of fruits and/or vegetables.

- Each team will provide their own equipment and supplies.
- Teams will have 30 minute to prepare their dish and clean up their area.
- May bring presentation script with you.
- May have a picture of the dish being created, no writing or direction on the picture.
- Teams will provide their own food items.
- NO electricity will be available at work area.
- Teams must bring gloves, trash bags, paper towels, and a first aid kit.
- Practice food safety.
- Presentation should include introduction, creative dish name, two major nutrients, food preparation principles, food safety considerations.
- All team members must participate in the presentation.

Basic Requirements for Applicants (all must be met)

- Must be entering high school in the 9th 12th grade as of August 1, 2023
- Must be an actively enrolled member of Oklahoma 4-H for 2022-2023
- Selection requires mandatory participation in an introductory training in the Summer of 2023

Basic Expectations of Oklahoma 4-H Shooting Sports Ambassadors

- Be an active part of the Shooting Sports Ambassador group statewide and within your district
- Communicate with fellow state Shooting Sports Ambassadors and the designated adult Advisor(s)
- Maintain personal conduct at all times that will represent a positive leader and role model for 4-H and the shooting sports industry
- Be an active, positive support for the 4-H Shooting Sports project
- Assist in maintaining relations with 4-H Faculty and Extension Administrators as well as past, present and future program donors and supporters
- Be available and participate in various activities and events other than competitions to promote and support 4-H Shooting Sports

Application Process

- Review and understand all details in the information section
- Complete the Oklahoma 4-H Shooting Sports Ambassador application, submitting both an electronic and hard copy by April 10, 2023



Criteria for Selection

OSU Extension and Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development Program is committed to ensuring the Oklahoma 4-H Shooting Sports Ambassador program is representative of the diversity of Oklahoma, is represented by youth across all shooting sports disciplines, members who have displayed good service to their communities and show leadership skills, and members that can act on their decisions and represent Oklahoma 4-H and Oklahoma 4-H Shooting Sports professionally. Final selection will be based on accumulation of scores from application/references, and interview.

Science Fair Guidelines

The goal of this project and exhibit is to allow 4-H members to:

- Use the scientific method to gain an understanding of how things work and the variables that affect them.
- Take an open and creative approach to problem solving.
- Learn that a successful outcome is based not on personal opinion but on scientific fact.
- Improve written and visual communication skills.

4-H members are encouraged to use their 4-H projects as the basis for their science fair project. Exhibits should relate to one of the following topics:

- Behavioral and Social Sciences
- Biochemistry, Medicine, and Health Sciences
- Botany and Zoological Sciences
- Computer Science

- Earth and Space Sciences
- Engineering
- Environmental Sciences
- Mathematics
- Physical Sciences


Displays must be free standing and are limited to 3' x 4' (height x width) when sides are extended. Commercially available "Science Fair Presentation Boards" are encouraged.

Participants provide their own table – such as a folding card table.

Presentation - participants will give an oral presentation about their science fair project and may be asked questions about the information presented.

No firearms or live animals are permitted.

Division	Age / Grade	Display	Presentation
Beginning	Grades 3-5	Display illustrating the project	3-5 minutes
Intermediate	Grades 6-8	A display with an accompanying report of approximately two (2) typewritten pages.	5-12 minutes
Advanced	Grades 9-12	A display and a written report about the project that includes an interview with a scientist, science teacher or someone who is knowledgeable about the area that is being studied. Reports should be three (3) to five (5) pages in length.	5-12 minutes
Team – up to 3 members	All grades	Display and a written report about the project. It is recommended that it include an interview with a scientist, science teacher or someone who is knowledgeable about the area that is being studied Reports should be three (3) to five (5) pages in length.	5-15 minutes, each member of the team should contribute to the presentation.
