Oklahoma 4-H'ers learn gratitude through membership

As 2025 draws to a close, Oklahoma 4-H'ers and their families are gathering to reflect on the year, cherish the moments they shared and focus on one of the most important life skills – gratitude.

Gratitude is a mindset that encompasses more than saying “thank you.” Gratitude enables club members to not only be grateful for what they have, but also inspires them to give back to their communities, said [Cathleen Taylor](#), state leadership and civic engagement specialist with the state [4-H](#) office at Oklahoma State University.

“Gratitude fits right in with the philosophy of head, heart, hands and health,” she said. “When they recite the 4-H pledge, they aren’t just saying the words – they live the words through everything they do in 4-H. Gratitude is woven into the fabric that is 4-H. Showing gratitude and giving back is something we do well in Oklahoma.”

By practicing gratitude, research shows youth build resilience, lower stress levels and develop positive coping skills. Gratitude also shows others that you’re loyal and understanding. Club members express gratitude to their club and project leaders for sharing their time and helping them develop into productive and caring leaders themselves.

“Project work encourages youth to be involved in their communities,” Taylor said. “As they work alongside other 4-H'ers, caring adult mentors and

members of the community, they get a sense of belonging and appreciation for everyone’s involvement. They also get a sense of pride in seeing how their efforts benefit the community.”

Gratitude also shows up in small ways, such as writing a thank-you note to a scholarship donor or a contest judge, older 4-H'ers mentoring younger ones or stepping up to help at the last minute. There are many ways in which gratitude is expressed in 4-H.

The Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development program relies on caring adults to mentor and share their knowledge with club members. Taylor said club members are grateful to these leaders, along with county Extension educators, for the things they learn and the knowledge they gain.

“In turn, club members carry this forward by sharing what they’ve learned through their project work and community involvement,” she said. “It’s a win-win for everyone.”

Gratitude is something people tend to think about more during the holiday season. But, Oklahoma 4-H'ers know the importance of showing gratitude every day of the year.

“The 4-H program will continue to nurture thankful and thoughtful young people as they share their time and talents within their communities and beyond,” Taylor said. “As we are on the brink of a new year, look back at all there is to be grateful for and look forward to the things we will be grateful for in 2026.”

Guidelines


- Entries will be checked in from 1:30-2:00
- Label entries on the bottom with name and class number.
- Individuals may enter one entry in each class.
- Each class will be awarded a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, place
- An overall champion and reserve champion will be selected for each age division.
- All items should be prepared by the 4-H member.

Kiddie Korner (under age 5)

- Class KK1- Sandwich cookies (use store bought cookies, such as vanilla wafers)
- Class KK 2 - snack mix
- Class KK 3 - Veggie and dip (adult May cut the veggies)
- Class KK 4 - 8 1/2" X 11" Food Collage

Clover bud Division (ages 5-8)

- Class CB1- (3) Decorated cookies (purchased cookies may be used)
- Class CB2 - fruit or vegetable snack
- Class CB3 - tortilla roll up (3 slices)
- Class CB4 - 8 1/2" X 11" one food group poster



Junior (grades 3-5)

- Class 1 - Muffins (3)
- Class 2 - Drop Cookies (3)
- Class 3 - Shaped cookies (3)
- Class 4-Decorated giant cookie or display of individual cookies
- Class 5-14" X 22" kitchen or food safety poster

Intermediate (grades 6-8)

- Class 6 - Yeast Bread (1/2 loaf)
- Class 7 - cinnamon rolls - no icing (3)
- Class 8 - Decorated Cake
- Class 9- Bar Cookies (3)
- Class 10-14" X 22" protein food safety poster

Senior (grades 9-12)

- Class 11- Cake (white or butter type, no icing)
- Class 12- decorated cake
- Class 13 - Bread from another culture (include a paragraph on how the bread fits in that culture.)
- Class 14 - Fruit pie
- Class 15-14" X 2" outdoor cookery or grilling poster

Classifications of Cookies

Class of Cookie	Description	Examples
Drop	Made from a soft dough and dropped by spoonfuls onto baking sheets	Chocolate chip, oatmeal, macaroons
Rolled	Made from a stiff dough that is rolled out using a rolling pin and cut into shapes with a cookie cutter	Gingerbread men, some sugar cookies
Shaped / hand molded	A stiff dough is rolled between the hands to form a ball and/or shaped using a mold or other shape or tool (fork, cookie stamp, bottom of a glass)	Peanut butter, snicker-doodles, almond crescents, some biscotti cookies
Pressed	A stiff dough is forced through a cookie press into decorative shapes	Spritz, spritzgeback
Refrigerator or icebox	Made from stiff dough that is rolled into a log, chilled, sliced, and baked	Pinwheels, shortbread, some sugar and biscotti cookies
No bake	Mixture may or may not be cooked on a range but these cookies are not baked in an oven	Chocolate no bake cookies, rice crispy treats
Bar	Dough or batter is baked in a cake or sheet pan and cut into bar shapes after cooling.	Brownies, chocolate chip bar

Table Setting Contest Guide

Description of Contest

Through participation in this contest, youth will learn valuable life skills in the areas of meal preparation – either formal or informal – meal etiquette, menu preparation, healthy food choices, and how to coordinate attire with menu and meal themes. Youth can use their imagination and creativity to create a welcoming and fun meal environment.

Rules for this Contest



1. Contestant may bring their own folding table (such as a card table), must not exceed 45 x 45 inches. OR One half of an 8' table will be assigned.
2. Contestants must provide table service (one place setting), centerpiece, and appropriate additional decorations.
3. Entries will have a theme of the contestant's choice. An index card with title or theme should be displayed on the table.
4. Contestant should wear attire appropriate for the table setting and planned meal.
5. Contestant should plan a healthy meal, based on MyPlate food guidelines. A complete menu on 4x6in display or larger is required to be displayed on the table.
6. Recipes for menu items are optional. A meal invitation is optional.
7. Contestant will prepare and bring one dish from the meal. Judges may sample the dish.
8. Youth should prepare a brief introduction of themselves, their table and a description of their theme and menu.
9. Judges will be given five (5) minutes per table. Youth should be prepared to answer questions about their table during judge observation.

Cloverbuds - Light snack

Juniors - Plan a simple lunch menu, bring one prepared dish from the menu

Seniors – Plan a casual dinner, bring one prepared dish from the menu

2026 Innovate Leadership Summit

The 2026 Innovate Leadership Summit will take place Feb. 27 to March 1 at the Courtyard Marriott in Norman, Oklahoma. Tracks for this year's summit include Meteorology and Geology/Paleontology.

Applicants must be active 4-H'ers in grades 8-12 with a strong interest in STEM education. A team of up to 25 Innovators will be selected for 2026.

Innovators must reapply each year.

Youth will need to have an adult partner registered to attend and work with them throughout the program. Adult partners must be a County Educator or Certified 4-H Volunteer. Adults may partner with more than one youth.

Applications are due by Sunday, Jan. 18, 2026, at 11:45 p.m. Applicants will be notified of their acceptance by Feb. 6, and the \$100 registration fee will be due by Feb. 13.

Potential applicants should contact their county Extension office for application information.

National 4-H Conference

The 2026 National 4-H Conference will take place April 10-15, 2026, at the Hyatt Regency Crystal City in Arlington, Virginia. This prestigious event brings together youth from across the country for leadership development, roundtable discussions and visits with national legislators.

Three Oklahoma 4-H'ers will be selected through an application process. If you're interested, contact your county Extension educator for details and guidance. Applications are due by midnight on Jan. 14.

Citizenship Washington Focus

Citizenship Washington Focus will be happening June 13-23, 2026. This is an 11-day hands-on civic engagement experience for 4-H members to learn about the government and history of America through tours, workshops, and experiences between Oklahoma and Washington, DC.

- County educators will complete registration for the event via ZSuite. Registration will open on December 15th at 8:00 am and will close on February 16th at noon. This experience is limited to 25 Oklahoma 4-H members, and the remaining will be added to a waitlist in case spots open up after receiving registration from Oklahoma, Kansas, and Missouri.
- The cost for CWF will be \$2,500.00, for the youth selected to attend.
- Counties may register one delegate and one alternate. On the registration, the designation of the delegate and alternate will be required. Delegates will be determined based on the registration time stamp received by ZSuite.
