Major County Fair Board

GENERAL RULES

1. The Major County Fair Board of the Major County Free Fair reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle all questions. In connection with the fair.

2. The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules, as they deem necessary or advisable without further notice. In the event of conflict of general and special rules, the latter will govern.

3. All exhibitors must be residents of Major County, a member of a Major County 4 -H Club, FFA Chapter, FCCLA Chapter, a bona fide member of a Major County OHCE Group, or attend a Major County School or reside in a Major County School District.

4. All property of every character entered for competition or display, or for any other purpose, will be subject to the control of the Fair Board, but in no case shall the Fair Board or any of it's officers be held responsible for any loss, damage, or injury to any character of to any such property while same is under the control of the Fair Board.

5. Exhibitors of livestock will be required to keep their stall open, clean and in order and their stock accessible to visitors at all reasonable hours during the Free Fair.

6. The Major County Fair Board WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY ACCI-DENTS OR INJURY TO ANY EXHIBI-TOR OR ANY OTHER PERSONS attending the Major County Free Fair.

7. No Junior exhibitor (4-H or FFA) will be allowed on the fairgrounds after 11:00p.m. without written permission of parents AND Extension Director *or* Ag Instructor.

8. If any article has been entered in a previous Major County Free Fair, it is not eligible to compete in the 2023 Free Fair.

ENTRY RULES

1. Articles not listed will not be exhibited. All entries must be pre-entered.

2. No article or animal will be allowed to enter except in the name of its bona fide owner. Each exhibitor must show his or her own animal, except in case of illness or school function conflict.

3. All exhibits of crops must have been grown during the 2023 crop year.

4. The Fair Board will furnish judges in all departments. The Fair Board reserves the right to substitute judges in case of necessity.

5. ALL EXHIBITS ARE REQUIRED TO HAVE AN ENTRY CARD FOR LIVE-STOCK, AND/OR AN ENTRY TAG FOR ALL EXHIBIT BUILDING ENTRIES. Livestock Entry cards will be provided. Exhibitors are required to see that their exhibits are properly tagged and entered. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to see that all information on the entry tag is correct. Cards can be obtained at the Fair Office. Actual exhibits (excluding livestock) will be brought to the Exhibit Building on Thursday, September 8, between 12:00p.m. and 7:00p.m. (See livestock rules for details). Entry tags for exhibit building entries will be available after pre-entries are made, during the specified time, at the OSU Extension Center. And must be picked up by 5:00p.m. on Wednesday, September 6.

6. All exhibits at the Free Fair will be released at the scheduled time. If not removed at that time, exhibits will become the property of the Fair Association. Animals and all other exhibits will be removed from the building.

Awarding Committee

1. When there is no competition, the judges will specify whether the article is worth the class. Awards will be by the single judge system. No appeal will be considered except in case of protest.

2. When special premiums are offered, they shall be paid directly by the donor.

3. All judges and awarding committees must be wholly disinterested directly or indirectly in the decisions, which they may have voiced.

Interference with judges is not allowed. When judges have carefully examined all articles and made a decision, the superintendent of the department will promptly mark the results and attach ribbons to the exhibits until the conclusion of the Free Fair.

Protests & Appeals

1. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Said protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and name and address of witnesses must be filed with the secretary of the Fair Board who in turn shall refer it to the Major County Fair Board whose decision shall be vidually during the year of weigh-in. final. The protest of appeal must be made 3. Exhibitors are allowed to weigh-in a within 24 hours after the award is made.

2. The right of an exhibitor to appeal from the decision of a judge to Board can only happen when it is charged that the award has been made in violation of the rules governing the exhibit or when it is charged that the decision of the judge has been influenced or interfered with by another.

3. In addition to the rights to protest herein guaranteed to exhibitors, the Fair Board reserves the right to take cognizance of fraud, consummated or attempted, in connection with an exhibit and take such action as may be deemed just and proper and as may be warranted in the premises.

Code of Ethics

Believing it is in the best interest of all exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to continue to present a wholesome and progressive image in the show ring, the following list of practices are considered unacceptable in the presentation of livestock. The use of such practices of procedures is, therefore, consid-

ered a violation of the Rules & Regulations governing the show. The official code of ethics of the Oklahoma State Fair Handbook, will be followed including, but not limited to:

1. Misrepresentation of the age or breed of the animal for the class in which it is entered.

2 Striking the animal to cause swelling.

Any attempt to change the natural 3. color of an animal.

4. Administration of a drug of any kind except for the treatment of a recognized disease or injury.

MAJOR COUNTY CATTLEMEN'S ASSOCIATION COMMERCIAL STOCKER PENS

(Note: Not held in Fall 2023)

For the Major County Fair/Jr. Livestock Show (exact dates for weigh-ins, weighbacks, and interviews are announced annually by the MCCA)

GENERAL RULES

1. Enter either pen of Steers and/or Heifers.

2. Stockers are weighed and priced indi-

maximum of five head per pen.

4. Stockers will be priced by a cattle buythe er or extension specialist.

5. Stockers are identified with an ear tag and color pattern is noted during weigh-in. 6. Stockers may be feed any way the exhibitor chooses. Most are turned out on wheat pasture. Some are run on grass and fed protein. Few have been program fed.

7. Wheat or small grain pasture price is determined at weigh-in. The going rate is used. An example is \$4.50 per hundred weight per month or \$ X per acre can be used.

8. The feed report is submitted for each pen of stockers. Feeding costs for the pen are determined by current prices of feed stuffs. Each ration, hay and protein source are individually priced and used for all pens.

9. Final weigh-back will be on the three best head (final three). The pen is priced as a whole, not as individuals and weighed. 10. 7. Two or three individuals with expertise in the Beef Industry will conduct interviews.

11. Final placings will be determined by performance of animals, records, and interviews.

12. Must live in or be a 4-H or FFA member in Major County.

Jr. (9-13) and Sr. (14 & up) age divisions for both Steer and Heifer divisions.
 Premiums of \$250 will be paid to each age division winner.

MAJOR COUNTY FAIR HORSE EXPO

SATURDAY, September 9, 2023, 6:00p.m. at the Wrangler Rodeo Arena (must have been pre-entered by August 27, 2023.

RULES

Exhibitors must be a resident of Major County, belong to a Major County 4-H or FFA Club, attend a Major County School, or reside in a Major County School District.

Premiums will be paid for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places in each class.

Age Divisions (as of January 1)

PeeWee – 8 & under Junior – 9–13

Senior – 14-18

Open—19 and older

Ownership of the horse is not necessary, **je however, the one horse/one rider rule will apply.** This means that a <u>horse</u> cannot compete more than once per class. *Example* - A horse can be shared 1. amongst family members and can compete once in Junior Barrels and once in 3. Senior Barrels, with different exhibitors 4. but not twice in Junior Barrels. 5.

NO STALLIONS allowed on grounds.

Exhibitors must wear collared shirts, jeans and boots. Hat is optional. No caps.

All exhibitors must have full control of their horse AT ALL TIMES and must be appropriately skilled to handle their horse safely and in a sensible manner.

An exhibitor may be excused from the DE arena by Show Management (Judge, Su-13. perintendent, or Fair Board Member) for 14. unruly/dangerous behavior which in-15. cludes excessive bucking/rearing/bolting 16. or aggressiveness towards another horse or exhibitor, *for example:* biting, striking, or kicking.

Show management may also suspend an exhibitor's right to participate in any class or disqualify an exhibitor for poor sports-manship, unruly/dangerous behavior, and/or inhumane treatment to their animal by exhibitor or exhibitor's parent.

A fall from either horse or rider will be considered a disqualification from that class.

Any exhibitor of any age needing assistance in the arena may be assisted by an ADULT ONLY on foot. The assisted exhibitor will not place above an unassisted exhibitor in that class. Halter classes judged on conformation will be the only exception but an ADULT will still need to assist exhibitor.

Prior arrangements need made for any special needs exhibitor.

TRAIL – After an exhibitor's 3rd refused attempt, exhibitor must move on to the next obstacle.

At judge's discretion, a time limit may be implemented.

A COPY OF A NEGATIVE COGGINS TEST (WITHIN 12 MONTHS OF SHOW DATE) IS REQUIRED. UPON PRE-ENTRY.

A release of liability form will be signed by each exhibitor and/or exhibitor's parents before that person will be allowed to compete.

Judge's decision is final and is NOT subject to protest.

-ALL exhibits in this department must be pre-registered! Pre-Registration required anytime between 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday, August 1 to 5:00p.m. Thursday, August 31. Use the pre-entry form included in the center of this book.

 ALL exhibits must be in place on Thursday, September 7, between 5:00 and 7:00 p.m., poultry will be blood tested for pullorum disease and cannot be left for judging until test is complete or at 7:00p.m. Judging will begin when all testing is complete.

1. All entries and awards in this department shall be subject to the General Rules and Regulations.

2. All poultry and rabbit exhibits will be released at 4:00 p.m. on Friday, September 8.

3. Poultry exhibitors should feed, water and clean cages each day of the fair.

4. Poultry can only compete in classes for which they are entered; i.e., birds entered in single classes cannot compete in trios and birds entered in trios cannot compete in singles.

5. All poultry can be banded.

6. Poultry showing any symptoms of disease may, at the discretion of the superintendent, be excluded from exhibiting, removed from the grounds B-07 Cock and returned to the owner. No sick B-08 Hen bird will be admitted.

7. All rabbits can be permanently B-10 Pullet earmarked.

8. Rabbits showing any symptoms of disease may, at the discretion of the superintendent, be excluded from the exhibition, removed from the grounds and returned to the owner. No sick rabbit will be allowed in the show.

9. Entrant MUST list breed of poultry or rabbit on the entry form. There will be no barnyard class.

10. Each exhibitor is allowed ONE ENTRY IN EACH CLASS.



The 4-H member must reference the source of the information by using an asterisk (*) or a number (if more than one) and name the actual source at the end or bottom of paper, poster or educational display following an asterisk or corresponding number in text.

No copyrighted or trademark protected written or visual material (pictures, photos, drawings, illustrations, etc.) should be used from books, magazines, publications, professional photographers, or from the internet without permission from the original creator.

If 4-H'er applies for and is granted permission to use a copyrighted or trademark protected item, a copy of the permission form or letter needs to be attached to the back of the exhibit and properly cited with an asterisk (*) or number. If an item (picture, photo drawing, illustration, etc.) that is not protected is used its source must

be cited and referenced by using an asterisk (*) or number and the source information placed at the end or bottom of paper, poster, or educational display, following an asterisk or corresponding number.

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

All educational displays must have stable, freestanding backs with sides attached. This includes Sec. 4301 and educational displays in specific project areas. See class description for size requirements. Educational displays must be 3-dimensional. Note: The sizes indicated in specific classes is the maximum table space allowed when sides are extended.

Do not include valuables, food items that will spoil or potentially harmful products (such as aspirin, cleaning products, chemicals, etc.) in any educational display. Neither the Oklahoma State Fair. or Tulsa State Fair, nor the 4-H Program can accept responsibility for loss of valuables. Potentially harmful products will be discarded. **Text of displays should be readable** from at least 10 ft. away.

POSTERS

For display purposes, exhibitors are encouraged to laminate all posters or cover them with clear plastic film. Posters must be signed and dated on the back with a permanent marker before laminating. If not marked the judging committee may mark or punch. All posters must be flat (no 3-dimensional posters). Text of posters should be readable from at least 10 ft. away. NOTE: Posters in section 4300 MUST include the 4-H Clover or mention 4-H. Posters in other sections/classes are encouraged to but are NOT required to include the 4-H Clover or mention 4-H unless requested in section/class description.

SIGNING AND DATING EXHIBITS

Exhibits should be permanently signed and dated, in an inconspicuous location, if material permits. Some exhibits that should be signed and dated are posters, most expressive arts and crafts including fine art, ceramics, woodworking and woodcrafts, herbarium cards, seed boards, forestry exhibits and model rocketry.

Judge or Judging Committee may permanently mark exhibit with fair and year (for example: OSF 2023), if not signed and dated. Effort will be made to mark it in an inconspicuous place.

<u>Rubber Band-Powered Vehicle</u> <u>Design Challenge</u>

Design a wheel-driven vehicle, powered only by one rubber band (size #64 approx. $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide by $\frac{3}{2}$ " long by $\frac{1}{32}$ " thick.), which will transport a one-pound "load" (box of baking soda approx. size: $\frac{3}{2}$ " x $\frac{4}{2}$ " x 2") at least 9 feet (on a smooth flat floor) while remaining within the boundaries of a 3 ft. wide parallel track (marked off with masking tape). Speed is not a criteria.

There are no restrictions on materials, size, weight or number of wheels. However, the only energy source permitted is the elastic energy of one rubber band. Commercially assembled vehicles are NOT permitted. However, commercially manufactured components may be used as parts of the vehicle. The vehicle must be self-starting (i.e., no pushing, external power starts, etc.). Propulsion of the vehicle must be through the wheels (i.e., no propellers, no launching mechanism). Transferring the energy of the rubber band to wheels via gears, fly wheels, etc., is encourages. No remote-control devices are permitted. A journal or engineering notebook should be included to describe the creation, purpose and function of the device. Explain how you built and tested your vehicle and if you made any modifications. Chart or graph collected data and explain how you measured improvements in your engineering notebook or iournal.

SECTION 4306 - Design and Construction

- All Design and Construction projects will be REQUIRED to have the Skill Mastery Sheet securely attached to the project. Use a safety pin and attach directly to the exhibit when at all possible. NEVER attach sheet to a hanger! The sheet MUST be completed by the 4-H member.

The skill mastery sheet (https://4h.okstate.edu/projects/ design-and-construction/curriculumandpatterns.html is an education tool to guide project work. Click Sample Technique Cards to find instruction for many of the techniques noted in the skill sheets (i.e. facings, zippers, hems, fasteners, etc.).

Fair exhibits have been carefully selected and directed for members to investigate and learn specific skills/information and to demonstrate mastery of these skills/ information.

The end-product/exhibit is being evaluated on the skills "learned/ mastered." The skill sheet serves as the member's "personal reflection" and communicates to the judge what was learned. Why is this important? Because in 4-H, the reflection and application of what was learned is more important than the end product/exhibit. The skill sheet is to be used as a planning tool. It is important that each 4-H member take responsibility for the life skill of "learning to learn." This may require members, leaders and educators to look up terms and learn techniques as part of the educational process.

Resources, instructions and project guides are posted online. Members are encouraged to seek out other valid resources which teach proper technique and knowledge in the areas of design and construction.

General Skills to be mastered in project/product in ADC, IDC and HTDC:

Structural Design: Construction technique, size, form, color and texture suited to the materials and product end use.

Elements of Design: The finished product illustrates the member is learning or "mastering" the basic elements of design - line, shape or form, texture, color, and space.

Principles of Design: The finished product illustrates an awareness and application of the principles of harmony, proportion, balance, rhythm and emphasis adding dimension, interest and/or appeal to the finished product.

Surface Design: This is any lines, shapes, colors, textures, or materials applied to the product or item's design that creates an emotional or personal quality, individuality and creative expression without disturbing initial/end purpose/how it is used. Design is that "something" which makes the item unique to the individual designer.

Reports/Descriptions/Expense Sheet/etc. – Exhibits requiring a report/description/expense sheet of any kind, can be typed or neatly/ legible handwritten.

Report should be one-two pages. If typed, it must be double spaced using a minimum of 12-point font. **Report MUST be SECURELY at**tached to the exhibit.

A county may enter one (1) exhibit in each class. A 4-H member may enter one (1) exhibit per class. Hangers will not be returned.

Awards: Ribbons will be awarded to the top 10 in each class.

APPAREL DESIGN & CON-STRUCTION - (ADC)

INTERIOR DESIGN & CON-STRUCTION - (IDC)

IDC project must be made largely from a textile product unless otherwise stated. A textile is a flexible material made of fiber/thread/yarn. Textiles are formed with various methods including weaving, knitting, crocheting, knotting or felting. Other words for textiles are cloth and fabric.

Grades 3-5 - Review section 4306 general instructions. Project must have at least two (2) skills/ techniques identified as appropriate for the ADC Level 1 or Level 2 project work. (Examples of housing accessories for special needs: sensory swing/activity fidget quilt/blanket/mat; station; bedding/pillows/lap blanket: weighted/pressure/gravity blanket; bed/chair/walker caddy; bath or kitchen accessory; bedrail; storage; etc.) See Citizenship through Service Learning and Sewing for Special Needs instructions

40. Seasonal Décor non fabric/ textile: wall hanging, centerpiece, decoration, or any other similar item not stated. Exhibit is not to be constructed primarily from fabric or any textile-based product. It can have some textiles (i.e., lace, ribbon, buttons, etc.)

41. Interior Design Project Portfolio: A portfolio is a great record keeping tool. It will be a valuable source for ideas and future projects, a place to share any project work done in IDC and provide a place to show samples of new techniques or knowledge explored in IDC. It is a notebook with three (3) sections – 1) Projects/Products, 2) Sample Technique Pages and 3) Creative Inspirations and Ideas. See Design Portfolio instructions. All Portfolios, regardless of grade, will be judged together.

HOBBIES/TEXTILE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION - (HTDC)

HTDC projects are made from a textile product created by the exhibitor, unless otherwise stated. A textile is a flexible material made of fiber/thread/yarn. Textiles are formed with various methods including weaving, knitting, crocheting, knotting or felting. Other words for textiles are cloth and fabric.

Grades 3-6 - Review section 4306 general instructions. Project must have at least two (2) skills/ techniques identified as appropriate for the ADC Level 1 or Level 2 project work. Some classes have specific skills/techniques which must be incorporated into the exhibit. See sample technique cards for some of the HTDC techniques.

42. Simple Sewn Stuffed animal, doll or puppet with both hand and machine stitching techniques. Focused on showing technique mastery/what was learned constructing the finished product.

43. Decorative Textile Technique: Skill techniques(s) being mastered/ learned - screen printing, transfer printing, fabric pens, tie dye, batik, stenciling, block printing or a similar method applied to a textile foundation such as a piece of clothing, fashion accessory or home décor purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Any skill technique listed in classes 44-47 are not to be exhibited in this class. Focus is on the 1) mastery of one or more decorative textile technique, 2) creativity, and 3) mastery of the use of the elements and prin-ciples of design.

44. Textile Fabric Creation: Skill technique(s) being mastered/learned - weaving (beading or textile), latchhook, braiding, macramé, knitting, crochet, felting, basket weaving or a combination of one of these techniques to create a textile. "Textile" defined as any woven, looped or felted thread or fibre. Focus is on 1) the mastery of one or more defined textile technique(s) used to complete a finished product 2) creativity and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design. Examples: toy/game (rug for doll house, doll, ball, etc.), home décor (doily, table scarf, pillow, coaster, wall hanging, plant hanger, small basket, linen - dish cloth, scrub, towel, pillow cover, etc.), clothing/ fashion accessory (hat, scarf, purse/ bag, jewelry, etc.) or similar small item. Any skill technique listed in classes 43, 45-48 are not to be exhibited in this class.

45. Needle Art by Hand: Skill technique(s) being mastered/learned hand embroidery, counted crossstitch, needlepoint, crewel embroidery, needle punch or smocking applied to towel, pillowcase, gar-**Pictures** ment, home accessory. must be framed. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Focus is on 1) the mastery of one or more "hand" needle art technique(s), 2) creativity, and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design.

46. Needle Art by Machine: Simple machine embroidery, cross stitch/ decorative stitches, or applique applied to small decorative items, , home accessories, towel, pillowcase, garment, picture, flag, banner, windsock, etc. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or

sewn by the exhibitor. Focused on 1) the mastery of machine created needle art techniques, 2) creativity, and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design. **NO full size quilts.**

47. Machine Pieced or Appliquéd Item – Skill technique(s) being mastered/learned is machine piecing and/or applique in the creation of a "textile/fabric. From the piece, design and construct apparel, fashion accessory, or home décor item. Focus is on 1) the mastery of one or more "machine pieced or appliqued technique(s)", 2) creativity, and 3) master of the use of the elements and principles of design. Examples might include picture or wall art, pillow, bag, doll quilt, flag, banner, windsock, etc. NO full size quilts. 48. Repurposed Textile Creation: Item made from repurposed textile material/product which can be worn/carried or used in the home. MUST include before and after (a picture being worn or displayed, showing how it was designed to fit room décor) photos, a description of the process - inspiration/design process, who it was made for, why the need, any special considerations, or any other pertinent information supporting the finished product. Focused on 1) appropriate use of repurposed textile, 2) quality of end product, 3) creativity, and 4) application of the elements and principles of design. 49. Stuffed animal, doll or puppet with a minimum of two (2) hand and two (2) machine sewing techniques (i.e., embroidered/appliqued/textile painted facial features, hair constructed from yarn/floss/fur, movable parts (arm, mouth, legs, etc.), use of fake fur, or any other similar combination of techniques showing mastery of skill/technique applied to the finished product.

50. Decorative Textile Technique: Create a piece of fabric using two (2) or more decorative textile techniques described in class 43. From the piece of fabric, design and construct apparel, fashion accessory, or home décor item. Any skill technique listed in classes 51-56 are not to be exhibited in this class. Focus is on the 1) mastery of technique, 2) the creative and appropriate blending of two or more decorative textile techniques, 3) the fabric/trim fittingly showcased in a finished product, and 4) master of the use of the elements and principles of design.

51. Textile Fabric Creation: Design and construction of an original textile [fabric or trim] using at least two (2) techniques described in class 45. Additional techniques might i

include but are not limited to hand spinning, cotton linter, and tatting. From the textile fabric, design and construct apparel, fashion accessory, or home décor item. Focus is on 1) the mastery of two or more textile technique(s) used to produce a textile, 2) creative and appropriate use of the "textile" in finished product, and 3) mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design. Any skill technique listed in classes 50, 52-56 are not to be exhibited in this class

52. Needle Art by Hand: Two (2) or more of these "hand" technique(s). Techniques include but not limited to embroidery [floss, yarn (crewel) or ribbon], cross-stitch, needlepoint, needle punch, smocking, Trapunto quilting, hand quilting, or similar techniques. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Exhibit must be a finished product, ready to display/use. Focus is on 1) the mastery of two or more "hand" needle art technique(s), 2) creativity, and 3) a mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design. This class is not intended for pieced quilts which do not fit the criteria described. A pieced quilt would be exhibited in class 54 or 55. 53. Needle Art by Machine: Two

(2) or more of these "machine" techniques: original free motion embroidery/thread painting, "modified" commercial/softwarebased embroidery design (must describe modification(s) on skill mastery sheet), Trapunto quilting, quilting, applique, or other advanced needle art technique(s) applied to clothing, fashion accessory or home/school/office décor. Base/ foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by the exhibitor. Focus is on 1) the mastery of two or more "machine" created needle art techniques, 2) creativity, and 3) a mastery of the use of the elements and principles of design. This class is not intended for pieced auilts which do not fit the criteria described. A pieced quilt would be exhibited as class 54 and 55.

54. <u>Hand</u> Pieced and/or <u>Hand</u> Appliquéd Item finished with <u>Hand</u> quilting. Piecing and/or applique and quilting MUST have been done by hand, not by machine. Junior (Grades 3-7)

Baby Book Any practical size, 1. minimum of 5 pages covering at least 9-10 months of development. Includes photographs, drawings mementos, and comments on developmilestones. Must be clear mental 4-H'er has contributed child that development information to book. Baby books prepared earlier by parents may not be entered unless 4-H'er reworks the information. Handwriting should be the youth preparing exhibit not an adult. See Unit One, page 13. Do not confuse with class 4. Children's Book.

2. Puzzles Help Children Learn Any size. Two (2) puzzles developmentally appropriate for children at two distinct Grades and ability levels. Each puzzle must have its own storage container. Puzzles must be sturdy and covered so they can be cleaned with damp cloth. Describe the child for whom the puzzle would appropriate by giving child's be Grades, interest, and ability. Puzzles should be suitable for either boys or girls. Do not indicate that a puzzle is for boys or girls only. See Unit One, page 13. Commercially made puzzles are not eligible.

3. Child Care Poster

Must be 14" x 22" and must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Judging committee may mark or punch if not marked. Text of poster should be visible for at least 10 ft. away. Choose one of these topics to develop poster: Behavior and Guidance--Include pictures and fact about child development. (See Unit One, pages 14-15 and No. 706); Safety Risks and Procedures--include common safety risks that a babysitter needs to be aware of and procedures to address the safety issue (See No. 575, pages 4 -7 Unit 1, pages 16-17; Unit 2, pages 28-29; 4-H Army Child & Youth Services Babysitting Student Guide, pages 25-44); ages and Stages of Development (No 575, page 10, 4-H Army Child & Youth Services Babysitting Student Guide, pages 49-50)

4. Basic First Aid Kit

Create a basic first aid kit from scratch (not a purchased kit) that includes the basic supplies to take care of small accidents such as bumps, scrapes, stings, and sprains. Include an emergency contact list in the first aid kit that includes but is not limited to: Emergency numbers for police, fire department, poison control, veterinarian, etc. Include a supply list and the cost to put the kit together. The kit should be in a container with a lid or zipper closure. Make sure there is a label on the kit that identifies it as a "First Aid Kit." See 4-H Army Child & Youth Services Babysitting Student Guide, pages 37-41)

Seniors (Grades 8-12)

5. Children's Book

Written. illustrated and constructed by 4-H'er. May be written for a specific with text relating to that child or for children of certain Grades range. Indicate appropriate Grades range. Construction paper, computer print out, cloth or poster board may be used. Illustrations may be drawn, photographs, appliqués, magazine pictures or reassembled from other books. See no. 707, Books for Children. Do not confuse with Class 1. Baby Book.

6. Surprise Suitcase

Fill suitcase with homemade or store bought items for children you babysit. Could include books, puzzles, games, play dough, balls, costumes. Indicate appropriate Grades child to use each item. Include records of how children have responded to materials. Package in suitcase that can be

7. Create a Game

Create a board game or card game to teach a specific topic to a child. Examples might include but are not limited to: Hygiene practices, exercise and fitness, safety, etc. Game boards must be 14" x 22" and must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Make sure to laminate game boards, cards or any pieces made of paper so that they are durable. Include written instructions of the rules of the game. Note in the instructions the Grades appropriateness of the game.

HEALTH/LIFESTYLE EDUCATION DIVISION SECTION 4308 4-H FOOD SCIENCE & NUTRITION FAIR

Individual 4-H members can enter one exhibit per class, but are restricted to those exhibits designed for his/her grade group. Educational exhibits must fit 3' x 4' (width x depth) space, with sides extended. Exhibits must be free standing with sides attached. Poster must be constructed on poster board 14" x 22". Posters and displays must be permanently signed and dated on the back prior to lamination. Judging committee may mark or punch if not marked.

Text of posters and displays should be readable from at least 10ft. away. Criteria for evaluating educational displays and posters include:

Originality of Idea - 20 points Educational Value - 50 points Display Value - 30 points

All food products must be on a paper plate and in a sealed plastic bag. The superintendent will only exhibit a slice of cake or bread and one cookie, muffin or roll of all exhibits and will dispose of all excess food.

4-H'ers may use recipes indicated in the food science manuals or any other recipe that fits the exhibit requirements. Cakes must be made from scratch using shortening mixing method (no angel food or chiffon-type). Bread machines may be used for the bread exhibits but bread must be made from scratch no mixes.

Dried foods should be exhibited in a sealed, plastic sandwich bag.

Canned foods should be placed in 8. One-half of one 8" layer Un-iced colorless, standard canning jars such shorten type cake (no angel food or as those made by Kerr, Ball, etc., chiffon) and properly sealed with two piece lids (no paraffin on jams and jellies). Other types of jars will be rejected. Judges will remove the screw-bands at time of judging. Labels should be neat and plainly written. Jars of iams and iellies being considered for ribbons may be evaluated for taste in addition to traditional attributes.

Only the top five (5) exhibits in each food preparation class will be displayed. All other exhibits may be picked up after judging is complete. Any exhibit not picked up the day of judging will be disposed of by fair officials.

- Each page of the story and the photograph must be mounted on one full sheet (22"x28") black poster or fam/matte board (22"x30").
- Posters are to be displayed horizontally.

Agronomic Crop Importance Display (Division 5403)

- FFA members are asked to write a brief description of the impact Genetically Modified Crops have made in American Agriculture.

- Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22"x14") or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20"x15") to be displayed for landscape view (horizontally).
- The student's name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.
- Only one exhibitor allowed per individual.

Hay Show (Division 5404)

 in addition to the entry tag.
- Displays will be judged on choice of species; quality of samples (green color, leafiness, dryness and stage of maturity); neatness and arrangement of

samples and general appearance of display; and correctness and readability of labels.

• Entries, which are found to be identical as a result of group preparation, will be disqualified.

Home Garden Food Basket Display

- The exhibit must be in a basket no larger than 18". It may be covered with a clear plastic cover, but judges must be able to handle produce to determine quality.

 One-third (1/3) of the judging is on how well the exhibit is prepared and presented. Packing such as paper, straw or cloth may be used, but the fruits/ vegetables should be the main attraction of the exhibit.

- Cards must be dated and numbered. Leaf specimens should be collected and prepared for exhibit during the same year they are being entered for judging. There must be a table of con-

tents in the front of the book. Name and chapter must appear on the inside back cover. Exhibit cards with one (1) FFA emblem and the lettering, FFA Herbarium Cards, on the front only, in a plain 1" hardback binder/ notebook for classes 01 – 02; or a plain 2" hardback binder/ notebook for classes 03 - 04.

Name and chapter must be printed on the back, upper left corner.

Photography Series (Division 5423)

 Oklahoma FFA members are required to include photographs as a part of their State FFA Degree scrapbooks or portfolio, State Proficiency Award applications, Reporter Contest scrapbooks, AgriScience Contest applications, etc., as well as, assisting with many chapter award applications such as Gold Emblem etc., which also requires photographs. The purpose of the photography contest is to provide an opportunity for individual FFA members to showcase their talent in this area while preparing for these state award applications.

- Entry must contain at least three (3), but not more than five (5), 5"x7" color prints that were taken by the member. The series must be mounted on black poster or matte board, preferably with a protective covering over the prints.
- Pictures on newsprint or those that have been mechanically altered will not be accepted.
- Subject must relate to the members supervised agricultural experience program (SAE) or to FFA activities within their local chapter.

01. FFA Photography

News Reporting (Division 5424)

FFA members are encouraged to submit newsworthy articles and pictures about outstanding accomplishments of individual FFA members and/or their local chapter to all forms of print and broadcast media. The purpose of the news reporting contest is to recognize individual FFA members for their talent and accomplishment in this area.

- Individual One (1) news story must be in manuscript form with not more than three (3), doublespace, typewritten pages. One (1) 5"x7" color or black and white photograph must accompany the story. Each page of the story and photograph must be mounted on one (1) large sheet of black poster or matte board, preferably with protective covering for each.
- Subject must relate to Agricultural Education and/or FFA.
- Entries will be judged on basis of news value, readability and organization.

AgriScience Project Display (Division 5425)

- The purpose of the AgriScience Project Display is to provide an opportunity for individual FFA members to compete in a science fair related to agriculture.
- This division is open to all FFA members who have developed a project based on the application of scientific principles and emerging technologies in agriculture.
- Display Requirements:
- Each exhibit should include information relevant to the study.
- All projects must have the following information attached to the exhibit:
 - Name of AgriScience fair participant(s) responsible for developing the project.
 - Chapter name, state
 - Title of category
 - Division (1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6)

- AgriScience fair participant(s)' display shows the results of the study utilizing a display board not to exceed the dimensions of 36" high (from top of table to top of display), 48" width and 30" deep (the distance from front to back).
- The display must consist of a stable, free standing display board and or easel on the provided table top not to exceed the sizes outlined above. No additional props, handouts or electronics are permitted, this includes: tablets, iPads, cell phones and other electronic devices.
