Having a Vision for Your Child

When parents divorce, it can be a traumatic situation for children. The normal routines and rituals they are used to get disrupted and so many things in their lives are changing all at once. Establishing new routines and rituals can help ease the transition they are experiencing.

As a parent, it's vital to be aware of your child's emotions and how they're responding to these changes in their life, said Katey Masri, coordinator for Oklahoma State University Extension's Co-Parenting for Resilience program.

"Children often respond to divorce in various ways. You and your coparent know your child best, and it's important for both of you to stay attuned to their needs and help them overcome these new challenges they're facing," Masri said. "The trauma of divorce is hard on children, but parents can help them be resilient and overcome the difficulties."

Obviously, divorce can be hard on children, but it doesn't have to be the end of the world. There are things parents can do to lessen the impact on their child and help guide them toward a bright future. By the same token, it's important to realize there are things parents may do that can make the situation even more difficult, as well.

Masri said having a vision and setting goals is a great way to take control of the situation and help put your children on a positive path.



"It's important to keep in mind you cannot control the actions of your coparent. However, knowing the path you and your children are on allows you to respond to some of the challenges you're facing," she said. "Child success is predicted by how parents 'parent' after the divorce. A divorce is stressful for everyone involved and can change the way you parent."

It's best to use a balanced style of parenting, which focuses on emotional expression, love and support for the child's needs and their best interests. Establish new routines and rituals as soon as you can in an effort to provide a sense of normalcy for the child while they are still adjusting to the fact their parents are divorcing.

Always be available to listen when your child comes to you and wants to talk. Let them show their emotions and feelings about the divorce.

"Sometimes this can be hard to hear, but allowing them to share what they're feeling is key to helping them bounce back and have a bright future," Masri said.

Balanced parenting also involves firm but appropriate discipline and open conversations about why the child is being disciplined. When parents use balanced parenting, children tend to be responsible, confident, caring and happy individuals.

"We understand co-parenting is can be difficult, but it's important for your child's future," she said.

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Mosquito Control

When we are blessed with rain it often brings mosquitos. Over 60 mosquito species occur seasonally in Oklahoma - from March through first frost in November. Remember, any container that will hold water for 5 to 7 days is a potential breeding site for mosquito larvae. One easy way to reduce larval mosquito populations is to drain any unnecessary containers/pools of water which allow mosquito larval development.

- ⇒ You should eliminate larval breeding sites such as discarded tires, beverage cups/litter, and unused children's wading pools.
- ⇒ Residents should clean and replenish pet water and bird bathes every 3 days, clean roof gutters to allow proper drainage, prevent standing water in flower pots, ensure good property drainage, and plug hollow tree stumps.
- ⇒ Water gardens or small fountains should be treated with larvicides or contain mosquito eating fish to prevent emerging adult mosquitoes.
- ⇒ Maintenance of screen doors and windows will prevent adult mosquitoes from entering homes.

····· HOW TO SELECT A ······

Choosing the right sunscreen can help reduce the risk of skin cancer and early skin aging caused by the sun. SUNSCREEN IS AN IMPORTANT TOOL in the fight against skin cancer, including melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer. The American Academy of Dermatology recommends consumers choose a sunscreen which states on the label: SPF 30 OR HIGHER BROAD SPECTRUM Means a sunscreen protects the skin from ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays, both of which can cause cancer. Water residant (40 minutes) Last RODINGUI AND AD SPECTRUM Water residant (40 minutes) WATER RESISTANT For up to 40 or 80 minutes. Sunscreen can no longer claim to be waterproof or sweatproof.

ONE OUNCE OF SUNSCREEN, enough to fill a shot glass, is considered the amount needed to cover the exposed areas of the body.

Pressure Canner Gauge Testing



Did you know that pressure canner gauges can be tested at the Major County OSU Extension Center? All you need to bring in is the lid with the gauge attached or just the gauge-- and please allow at least one day for testing. There is no charge per gauge for this service.



Let's Preserve!

Food preservation materials are available through the Major County OSU Extension Center as well. Handouts include several topics on food preservation such as: Peaches, Apricots, Nectarines, Pears, Jellies, Jams, Spreads, Cherries, Fruit Pie Fillings, Sweet Corn, Tomatoes, Apples, Leafy Greens, Peppers, and Snap Beans.

Also available is a booklet with salsa recipes for canning. These salsa recipes have been tested to ensure that they contain enough acid to be processed safely in a boiling water canner. We also have information on preserving many other foods as well.

Canning Headspace Guidelines

Headspace is the space from the top of the jar to the food or liquid in the jar.

Correct Headspace Guidelines -- As a general rule:

- 1. Leave 1-inch headspace for low-acid foods, vegetables and meats.
- Leave 1/2-inch headspace for high-acid foods, fruits and tomatoes
- Leave 1/4-inch headspace for juices, jams, jellies, pickles and relishes.

Why is it important?

Too little headspace -- Some foods, especially starchy foods, swell more than others and require additional headspace. If too little headspace is allowed, as food boils inside the jar it may be forced under the lid, leaving residue on the sealing surface and possibly preventing the lid from sealing.

Too much headspace -- The jar may not seal properly because the processing time is not long enough to drive the air out of the jar. And the food at the top of the jar may discolor.

Guidelines for the 2021 Major County Fair

The Major County Oklahoma Home and Community Education (OHCE) Association is sponsoring a *Quilt Block Challenge*. The winner will be determined by viewer's choice voting during the 2021 Major County Fair on September 9, 10 & 11.

- A \$5.00 participation fee is due when you pick up your fabric kit which is available at the Major County OSU Extension Center, located on the first floor of the county courthouse in Fairview.
- You will be provided one fat-quarter of the designated fabric. You must use the designated fabric. You may add any other 100% cotton fabric to complete your block.
- Your block may be of any design (original, traditional, etc.) as long as it measures a 12 ½" x 12 ½" square.
- You may only enter one quilt block per kit. (Multiple kits can be purchased.)
- Finished quilt blocks should be turned in at the Major County OSU Extension Center no later than 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 2, 2021 so they can be prepared for display at the fair for judging. (They will be displayed in the Exhibit Building.)
- This contest is open to any resident of Major County.
