The holidays are over, and the decorations stored away again until next year. Winter is the perfect time to explore Oklahoma and all our wonderful state has to offer. Here're a few ideas to get you started:

- 1. Go Fishing. Lake Hefner is a popular spot for ice fishing in the winter. Visitors can rent equipment and purchase bait at the lake's marina. The lake is stocked with a variety of fish, including catfish, bass, and crappie. Ice fishing is a fun and unique way to experience the outdoors in Oklahoma City. Or, if you love fishing but don't like the cold, <u>Lake Eufaula State Park's</u> enclosed, heated fishing dock at <u>Fountainhead Marina</u> offers the perfect spot to cast a line. Relax and spend the day leisurely baiting your hook and catching fish while enjoying the comfort and warmth of a toasty dock during the year's coldest months.
- 2. Take a swim (really!). If you just can't wait for summer to begin, the <u>Water-Zoo Indoor Water</u> <u>Park</u> in <u>Clinton</u> will keep you cool until the warmer months. This climate-controlled water park is kept at an ideal temperature for swimming all year. Enjoy over 28,000 square feet of activities for all ages including a Cub's Cove for tiny tots, the Tornado Bowl for the adventurous and even a Lazy & Crazy River for a relaxing dip.
- 3. Watch the Races at the Chili Bowl. Held at Tulsa Expo Square's River Spirit Expo, the Chili Bowl in Tulsa attracts over 300 talented drivers every winter to take part in five qualifying night races leading up to the Saturday night championship. Watch them zoom around the quarter-mile track for a chance at the title.
- 4. **Go on a winter hike at the Wichita Wildlife Refuge.** The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge is a beautiful place to explore any time of year, but it's especially stunning in the winter. The snow-covered mountains and frozen streams create a serene and peaceful atmosphere. Visitors can hike one of the many trails, go wildlife watching, or even try their hand at rock climbing.
- 5. **Attend the Martin Luther King, Jr. Parade**. The Martin Luther King Jr. Day Parade is an annual event that takes place in January. The parade celebrates the life and legacy of Dr. King and features marching bands, floats, and community organizations. The parade route runs through downtown Oklahoma City and ends at the Oklahoma State Capitol. There are also other parades in cities across the state.

HEALTHY LIVING Recipe of the Month Sweet Potato Turkey Bake From the ONIE Project

Ingredients:

1 cup	quick-cooking barley	
2 Tbsp	olive oil	
2 Med	sweet potatoes, diced	
1 lb	93/7 lean ground turkey	
2 tsp	dried rosemary	
2 cloves	garlic, minced	
2 cups	frozen kale	
Non-stick cooking spray		
2Tbsp	whole-wheat flour	
¾ cup	1% low-fat milk	
¼ cup	unsalted chicken broth	
1 cup	shredded part-skim mozzarella	
	cheese, divided


Preparation:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F. In saucepan, prepare barley according to package directions. Set aside.
- 2. In a large skillet, heat oil over high. Add sweet potatoes, turkey, rosemary & garlic. Cook 10 minutes or until turkey is cooked through, crumbling throughout. Add kale & stir to combine.
- 3. Lightly coat a large casserole dish with cooking spray. Combine turkey mixture & barley in the skillet. Spread evenly in the casserole dish.
- 4. In the saucepan add flour, milk & broth. Whisk continuously until smooth. Add ½ cup of the cheese and heat on low. Whisk until cheese is melted.
- 5. Pour sauce over turkey mixture. Top with remaining cheese & bake 10 minutes or until sauce is bubbly & cheese is melted.

Tips: Don't like kale or want to switch it up? Use fresh or frozen spinach instead.
