SASHIKO STITCHING WORKSHOP – AUGUST 16TH

Scissor Tales Quilt Guild will be hosting a Sashiko Stitching workshop on Saturday, August 16th, 12:00-4:00pm, at the OSU Extension Conference Center. Cost is \$50.00 and includes a project bag with Sashiko thread and needles, pocket guide, marking pen, pre-printed design cloths, project cords and more. No sewing machine necessary. Bring a basic sewing kit to class that includes small embroidery scissors. Sue Esparza of Two Sisters Quilting will be the instructor.

Sashiko (from the Japanese "little stabs") is a form of decorative reinforcement stitching for functional embroidery. Traditional Sashiko was used to reinforce wear points or repair worn places/tears with patches. To register, mail check made to "STQG" to OSU Extension, 2500 NE 63rd, OKC, 73111.

Frozen Yogurt Bark

Ingredients:

- Wax paper
- 2 cups non-fat Vanilla Greek yogurt
- 1 cup sliced strawberries
- 1/2 cup of blueberries
- 1/2 cup granola

Preparation:

- * Line a baking sheet with wax paper.
- * Spread yogurt on baking sheet in an even, thick layer.
- * Top yogurt with strawberries, blueberries, and granola.
- * Freeze 2 3 hours or until firm.
- * Cut it into pieces and serve. Store leftovers in the freezer to enjoy later.
