GENEALOGY GROUP By Kathy Fetters

The Genealogy Group met Wednesday, May 15th, in the Conference Room at the OK County Extension Center. We had 15 in attendance, which included one visitor, Roger Farrer. Roger had seen the meeting notice in The Oklahoman. We filled every single chair that was available.

President Jan Beattie presented the New Member certificate to Loyce Edwards, who had not been able to attend the Award Luncheon. Our group received awards for Education, Membership, County Fair, Community Service and Secretary Book.

Our speaker for May was member Glenn Clure, Sr. Glenn has been involved in genealogy since his mother-in-law asked him to accompany her to a genealogy class in 1988. Since that time, he has been able to trace at least one line back as far as 1785. He is also proud that he has many ancestors that were in Oklahoma before statehood. Besides being a member of OHCE Genealogy Group, Glenn is also a member of the Oklahoma Genealogical Society and the Edmond Genealogical Society.

Of course, like all genealogists, Glenn has acquired many documents, photographs, personal family items and other miscellaneous papers. After he discovered he had downloaded the same document three times he knew he had to get rid of the piles and stacks and get organized. In the presentation, Glenn pointed out the importance of having a specific system to keep track of every item with the goal of being able to locate it quickly, and citing the source where the original was found. While Glenn does scan and store all his paper items and photographs onto the computer, he also saves the paper copies, so his system works with both methods. He gave out several handouts of forms he uses to record his research and a checklist to make sure he has looked for every vital record and census. Glenn stressed backing up your electronic data regularly and using external hard drives. His



presentation certainly inspired us to go home and get started in scanning and organizing with the goal of eliminating our own stacks and piles.

Recipe of the Month Peanut Butter Banana Bread From Choose Homemade-onieproject.org/recipes

Ingredients:

- Non-stick cooking spray
- 1 Cup all-purpose flour
- ½ Cup whole-wheat flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- ¼ tsp salt
- 3 Ripe bananas
- ½ Cup creamy peanut butter
- ½ Cup plain non-fat Greek yogurt
- ½ Cup unpacked brown sugar
- 1 Large egg
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 Cup mini chocolate chips

Preparation:

- *Preheat oven to 350*F. Lightly coat a loaf pan with cooking spray& set aside
- *In a medium bowl, add both flours, baking soda & salt.
 Stir to combine, set aside.
- *In a separate bowl, mash bananas with fork. Add peanut butter & yogurt. Mix well. Add sugar, egg & vanilla extract. Stir until smooth.
- *Add in dry ingredients. Stir until just combined. Fold in Chocolate chips.
- *Pour batter into pan. Bake 45 minutes, or until top is Browned & a toothpick inserted into the center Comes out clean. Cool & cut into 8 slices.

TIPS: Make into muffins! Bake 20 minutes at 350*F
