2021 Master Composter Training

The third annual Master Composter Program was held every Wednesday from September 15th through October 20th. Each class included four hours of compost training with classroom and hands-on experiences capped off by a tour to a commercial composting facility. Participants of the program received 21 hours of classroom instruction and will complete a composting-related service project in their community in the coming months. Each year, Master Composters are encouraged to continue to serve their communities through volunteering. Thirty-four students completed the 2021 Master Composter training, the largest class to date.
