### **Earth Kind**

April 22nd is Earth Day and every year our Extension Horticulturalist, Julia Laughlin, teams up with the City of Oklahoma City Water Utilities Trust and the Friends of Will Rogers Gardens to celebrate with an "Earth-Kind Earth Day" educational event. This event was held at Will Rogers Gardens in OKC and programs were taught on environmental topics like water conservation in the landscape, selecting drought tolerant, adapted and native plants, supporting pollinators, soil building, composting and nature friendly gardening methods.

The morning classes were followed by a locally sourced lunch and then demonstration in the gardens including a ladybug release, composting demonstration, a tree seedling, and seed giveaway.

This year's event was attended by over 130 participants and involved almost 20 volunteers.

### Metro Library Urban Agriculture and Natural Resources Programs

Urban Agriculture Educator, Josh
Campbell taught multiple classes in April
at the Metro Library to support thier new
garden tool lending library program.
Class topics included Spring Vegetable
Gardening, Backyard Composting, and
Backyard Chickens.

Classes taught on backyard chickens were designed to fulfill the City of Edmond's 2-hour educational class requirement on chicken care before qualifying for a permit to keep backyard chickens.

The Fresh Start program is hands-on and teaches new skills that participants can use at home every day from planning, shopping, and cooking tips to simple solutions for healthy eating and daily physical activity. Her overall energy increased when her activity level improved and her weight declined. It was a great time with this class full of success stories.

# BABYSITTING WORKSHOP/BOOK CLUB AT BELLE ISLE LIBRARY

A Babysitting 101 workshop was held at the Belle Isle Library in April, with twelve students becoming certified. Teens learned how to be responsible for children, created babysitting bags, learned how to market their business, and made healthy snacks. There was also information provided on infant care, focused on safe sleep practices. As an introduction to the workshop, the library provided free copies of a Babysitter's Club graphic novel, with plans to start a book club focused on the classic book series. Students discussed the babysitting experiences the characters had in the story and learned from their mistakes during the class.

Additional babysitting workshops will be held in June at the Choctaw Library and the Multi-Activity Center at Mitch Park in Edmond.









Oklahoma County youth competed in the annual Food Showdown competition. The Food Showdown is a culinary challenge where three member teams compete to create a dish while demonstrating their knowledge in foods and nutrition, kitchen safety, equipment, and creativity in food preparation.



Teams were provided secret ingredients and items from the common pantry, and tasked with making a meal in 45 minutes. From the secret ingredients, 4-H members must identify, prepare and then present information related to the serving size, nutritional value and cost of the dish.



This year, we had eight teams participating, six junior teams and two senior teams.

These kids entered the competition with varying levels of experience. The winning Junior and Senior level teams will go on to represent Oklahoma County in the District Showdown in May for a chance to advance to the State Food Showdown.







# Harrah High School College and Career Fair

Oklahoma County 4-H Educator, Mindy McNeil, has been working with the principal of Harrah High School, David Hairell, for two years. She has taught many programs at HHS including Mindfulness and Financial Literacy.

Financial Literacy has been a big focus for Harrah High School since it has become a graduation requirement. Over the last two years, approximately 125 students have received Financial Literacy education from Mindy.

Mr. Hairell and Miss McNeil decided to host a College and Career Fair for the Junior and Senior Classes this Spring. On April 26th, seven different schools and organizations gathered to share resources with these students. Mr. Hairell wanted to focus on programs close to home that offered students opportunities to enter the workforce as well as higher education. They plan on repeating and enlarging this program in the fall of 2023.
