Savannah Mackey, OSU summer intern, taught the campers about the importance of keeping hydrated and eating a well-balanced diet. The youth learned from other staff the importance of hand washing and how to relax their body and mind with Yoga.

Every day, the youth were shown how to prepare their own meals and sent home with groceries and recipes so they can make the meal at home with their families.









Talk Saves Lives: An Introduction to Suicide Prevention

Youth Mental Health Specialist, Danyelle Kuss, presented the Talk Saves Lives program to new educators in the Canton School District. Talk Saves Lives is an introduction to suicide prevention that covers the general scope of suicide, the research on prevention and what people can do to help saves lives.

Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death for ages 10-24 in Oklahoma. This makes the topic of suicide prevention an essential knowledge base for the educators and community leaders who support our youth on a daily basis. Suicide is a public health problem that can be prevented. This program is a nation wide effort created by the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.
