













## Youth Urban Agriculture Pilot Program

In November, Urban Agriculture and Natural Resources Educator, Joshua Campbell launched a youth urban agriculture training project in partnership with the Oklahoma City based community development organization Restore OKC. This pilot program is providing classroom and hands-on instruction to the students in the Restore OKC internship program. The content has been adapted from adult educational programs such as the Beginning Farmer school.

Students are provided with weekly lessons over a six-week period that cover important topics related to urban food production. Those include soil health, water, food safety, selling and marketing.

# PLANT A ROW FOR THE HUNGRY

The Oklahoma County Master Gardeners and their advisor, Julia Laughlin, managed three 18' x 18' raised beds at the community garden behind the Northeast Campus of Oklahoma County's Health Department last summer. They grew vegetables for those in need in Oklahoma City, including tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, watermelons, greens and other vegetables. Although the heat reduced the amount of harvest, the Master Gardeners donated over 250 lbs of produce to local homeless facilities and church food pantries.













## Master Wellness Volunteers at Health Fair

Master Wellness Volunteers hosted an educational table for the Oklahoma City University Health Fair on Wednesday, November 9th. Volunteers included Honorata Gruzewski, Myra Moaning, LaDonna Hines and program advisor Taylor Conner, FCS Educator. MWVs shared educational information on the misconceptions of sugars and provided handouts from the Sugar Association. The table consisted of a display of different types of beet and cane sugars on the market. The health fair reached roughly 150 employees of the University.

Oklahoma County 4-H in partnership with the Lynn Institute, collected donations of Hats, Underwear, Gloves, and Socks for the Homeless Alliance and Citizens Caring for Children. The Homeless Alliance provides support for vulnerable individuals with shelters, outreach programs, and supportive employment opportunities. Citizens Caring for Children provides support for foster families by providing clothing and school supplies for children in the foster care system.

Many donations were collected, including 466 items of clothing for children, 550 items of clothing for adults, and 56 hygiene kits. We would like to thank Oklahoma County Master Gardeners, OHCE members, and staff from the Oklahoma County Courthouse as well as the 4-H members who placed collection boxes at schools, churches, and local businesses. The community really reached out to help during this annual clothing drive and the 4-H'ers look forward to it every year.
