Protecting Mental Health for Lasting Volunteers

Mental Health Specialist and Educator, Danyelle
Kuss was invited to present a workshop in
collaboration with the Youth Volunteer Corps. This
year's Youth Volunteer Summit was hosted in
Tulsa, Oklahoma, and drew youth volunteers from
all over the United States and internationally.
Youth ranged from 11-18.

Those in attendance learned a variety of skills to protect their mental health and avoid burnout in order to become lifelong volunteers. Youth ages 16-17 represent the largest age group in America who formally volunteer. Participants explored the benefits of volunteering on their physical and emotional health and participated in activities to solidify learning.

These activities included a Tower of Stress Jenga game and Speed Dice to help them identify what stress feels like in their bodies. Youth practiced breathing techniques to help calm in the moment as well as processed how boundaries can support efforts to avoid burnout.





CNEP Grant for The Urban Mission

For the past year and a half, FCS Educator Taylor
Conner has been teaching programs at The Urban
Mission's after-school kids program S.P.A.R.K.
(Support Program of Arts and Reading for Kids).
These youth programs typically consist of cooking
classes or food tastings.

There was an apparent need for basic cooking supplies at the facility for programming. Back in April 2023 Taylor applied and was awarded a \$500 Community Grant from the Community Nutrition Education Program. All of the funds were put towards cooking supplies including electric skillets, measuring utensils, kid's knives, mixers, bowls, aprons and more.

During the month of October, Taylor delivered the supplies and conducted a cooking class with the kids. They made peanut butter banana granola wraps.















Fall Break Babysitting Workshop

Family and Consumer Sciences Educator,
Lisa Hamblin, held a Babysitting 101
workshop at Ralph Ellison Library during Fall
Break.



Teens attending the two-day event learned how to safely take care of children, market their babysitting business, and were certified in the American Heart Association's CPR/First Aid/AED program.



City/County Health Department staff and volunteers provided the CPR training, as well as information on infant safe sleep and shaken baby syndrome. Additionally, OSU Extension's CNEP (Community Nutrition Education Program) coordinator, Lori Goodbary, taught the teens about healthy snacks and the importance of handwashing.



Students received a workbook, completion certificate and a bag of items to use when babysitting.







Graduating Master Gardener's Class of 2022

On October 13, 2023 Oklahoma County Master Gardener's class graduated after studying and volunteering in the county for over a year.

The class began in September of 2022 with 12 weeks of one day classroom education in horticultural topics such as soils, landscaping, vegetable gardening and many other topics.

Once their classroom experience was completed, they volunteered as interns at the OKC Zoo, Will Rogers Gardens and the Extension Demonstration Gardens. As interns, they also fielded calls, email and walk-in horticulture questions form the public at the Extension Call Center.

Mater Gardner Class

Thirty-seven students graduated from the program and each received a Master Gardener badge, certificate, manual, and tote bag. These Certified Master Gardeners will now go on to join the Oklahoma County Master Gardener Association and serve as volunteers all over Oklahoma County participating in educational and gardening activities.

KIK It Up! is an afterschool and summer program for ages 6-15 years. Youth are given the opportunity to learn essential nutrition concepts and engage in fun physical activities.

Teen Cuisine is a hands-on cooking program that teaches students in grades 8-12 important life skills for eating smart, which will stay with them as they grow into adults.

October is a very special and busy time for Oklahoma County 4-H members. In an official ceremony, the Board of Oklahoma County Commissioners voted to proclaim October 2023 as 4-H Month. Breya Spencer read the proclamation for the BOCC Meeting and recited the 4-H Pledge. To show appreciation for this display of support, seven Oklahoma County 4-H'ers held a reception for the commissioner's and their staff.

The annual 4-H Awards Banquet was also held this October. This event was an afternoon to remember, filled with recognition and honor. We celebrated the accomplishments of our 4-H members, leaders, and supporters who have shown exemplary dedication to our program throughout the year. Awards were presented in various categories, including leadership, community service, and project excellence.

H.U.G.S. Service Project

Oklahoma County 4-H also launched it's annual service project, H.U.G.S., collecting hats, underwear, gloves, and socks with items being donated to Citizens Caring for Children and the Homeless Alliance. Over 2,000 items were delivered to the organizations providing for the unhoused population and foster families in Oklahoma.











Teen Leadership Conference

The Southeast District Teen Leadership Conference was held over October 11-13th. Members who attended were encouraged to be bold, creative, and grow their leadership abilities. Oklahoma County 4-H had a great showing at this year's event, bringing the most members of any county in attendance. Additionally, two of our own were elected onto the 2023-24 Southeast District Leadership team. Breya Spencer was elected as the SE District Recreation Leader, and Violet Spencer was elected as the SE District Vice President. They will serve in these leadership positions until the fall of 2024.

National Association of Extension 4-H Youth Development Professionals Conference

Representing Oklahoma County 4-H, Mindy McNeil attended the NAE4-HYDP National Conference in Pittsburgh, PA. Mindy received the Achievement of Service Award, an award honoring 4-H Professionals with between 3 and 7 years of service. Mindy also serves as the State Association Treasurer.

This conference provides an opportunity for professional development and networking with other 4-H professionals across the country.
