





Oklahoma 4-H offers ATV safety course

The weather is warming up and soon students will be on summer vacation. A fun activity for many youth is riding All-Terrain Vehicles, otherwise known as ATVs and utility task vehicles, also known as UTVs.

To help ensure both youth and adults ride safely, the Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development Program offers the <u>ATV Riders Course</u> to groups, organizations, families and individuals ages 10 years and older who are interested in learning more about safely operating both ATVs and UTVs, said Ravyn Bevard, <u>Oklahoma State University Extension</u> youth ATV safety educator.

"As we transition from winter to warmer weather, more people want to get outside and enjoy the outdoors," Bevard said. "The overall goal for the ATV Rider Course is to provide youth and adults with the opportunity to learn how to safely ride these vehicles. With National ATV Safety Week observed May 13-21, now is a great time to get your organization, family or group signed up to take the course."

The two-part course consists of a two-hour online E-Course coupled with a three-hour hands-on riding component conducted by licensed ATV Safety Institute instructors. Participants are asked to complete the online course before the hands-on course.

Bevard said the actual riding part of the training can take place at the riding facility near the Logan County Fairgrounds in Guthrie, Oklahoma, or she can take the machines to the participants' location. It can be taught at a school, church or other location with an open field or gravel lot. Groups must have at least four participants.

"At our facility in Guthrie riders will get the full experience for all of the exercises, including trail riding, hills and an open field," she said. "If we go on location, participants will do a circuit ride in various patterns."

She also covers proper gear to wear to ride, including a helmet, gloves, long sleeves, long pants and closed-toed shoes that come up over the ankles. She familiarizes the group safety information as well as basic ATV controls, including brakes, foot brakes, choke, lights and ignition.

"One of the most important lessons we teach in these classes is weight shift. ATVs are very rider-active," she said. "Riders have to know how to shift their weight for different scenarios they encounter, such as rounding a corner or driving over an obstacle on the trail. ATVs have long seats to allow riders the space they need to shift. That extra room isn't there to make room for another rider."

Bevard said 90% of fatalities are related to individuals not wearing a helmet or riding an ATV that's too big for them.

"Unfortunately, about 90% of kids ride adult-sized ATVs, which is dangerous," she said. "These machines are expensive, and kids can quickly outgrow the smaller machines, but it's important to ride the correct size. Consider buying the smaller machines for younger youth and trading them in as they grow."

A grant provided by the Southwest Ag Center at the University of Texas was used to purchase helmets and participants who go to the class at Guthrie will receive a free helmet while supplies last. The class costs \$10 per person and reservations can be made by emailing Bevard at reverd@okstate.edu or call 405-744-4141.

"With summer just around the corner, kids will have more free time. With that free time, we want them to be safe," Bevard said.
