Tulsa State Fair Nominations will be available on June 1st. The link to the Nomination website will be on the Ottawa County Extension website. If Ottawa County exhibitors (4-H or FFA) order a nomination kit by June 12th, Reba Palmer will pick them up and bring them to the Ottawa County Fair Tag-In. ***EXHIBITORS MUST LET US KNOW IF THEY HAVE ORDERED A KIT TO BE PICKED UP BEFORE OR ON JUNE 12th.** Email Reba, rmmccar@okstate.edu, or call the Extension office to let us know if you need a kit picked up. Livestock and Dairy entries close on June 15th. Disregard the information in the May newsletter about entering animals as a pen, enter each as a single animal. Make sure all of your entries have your Club or Chapter on them, unless they are in the Open class. Please enter all "Bred & Owned" animals in both the "Registered" class and "Bred & Owned" class. If you have questions, call the office!

All other entries close on August 1st. This includes Horse Show, Dog Show, Tractor Driving Contest, Poultry, Rabbit, Bucket Animals, and Indoor Exhibits. Call the Extension office with any questions.

OCF Tag-In will be June 14th 5-9 pm and June 15th 7-9 am. You will receive your county tags and 840 tags here. All livestock and dairy animals **MUST** come to Tag-In. All Market Steers, Market & Breeding Heifers, Market & Breeding Goats, Market & Breeding Sheep, Market & Breeding Swine. All Dairy Goats and Dairy Cattle. Dairy goats, breeding goats, and breeding sheep need to have scrapie tags. All Breeding and Dairy Animals need to have birthdate available. Bring registration papers for heifers.

Safety is vital when using ATVs

With school out for the summer, Oklahoma youth will be spending a lot of time participating in outdoor activities such as swimming, hiking and riding bikes. Some youth will also be riding all-terrain vehicles and utility-task vehicles.

Just as people take safety precautions when swimming and biking, safety must be a top priority when riding ATVs and similar vehicles, said Ravyn Bevard, <u>Oklahoma State University Extension</u> youth ATV safety educator.

"Parents don't think twice about putting their kids in life jackets or bicycle helmets," Bevard said. "Following all safety rules and regulations for ATVs and UTVs is just as important."

ATVs and similar vehicles are useful for various tasks around the home and farm and simply for enjoying the outdoors, but it is vital for all riders, especially youth, to wear Department of Transportation-approved apparel, including helmet, goggles, long sleeves, long pants, gloves and over-the-ankle boots.

"Of all the safety equipment suggested, a helmet is the most important piece of safety gear," she said. "Research has shown that wearing a DOT-compliant helmet can reduce the risk of death in a crash by up to 42%."

In addition to proper safety gear, it is also important to ride a machine that's the appropriate size. About 90% of kids who are riding ATVs are riding adult-size machines. Having machines that are the proper size can help reduce the chance of an accident. Larger, adult-sized machines are harder to handle, especially for riders ages 10 to 16. Smaller versions are easier and safer to handle.

Don't exceed the rider limit on any machine. If there's one seat, only one rider at a time. The same is true for side-bysides. If the vehicle has two seats, only allow two riders at a time. Adult supervision is encouraged at all times, especially for younger riders.

Bevard said maintaining a safe speed is important for overall safety of the riders, especially those who are new to this experience.

As the name implies, all-terrain vehicles are designed to be ridden off-road. Avoid riding on paved roads whenever possible. If the need arises to cross a paved road to get from one area to another, stop and look both ways before crossing the road.

"One of the best ways to ensure safety while using an ATV or UTV is to take a rider safety course," she said. "These courses cover the basic safety information in a classroom environment and provide hands-on learning opportunities.

The Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development program offers an <u>ATV Riders Course</u> to groups, organizations, families and individuals ages 10 years and older who are interested in learning more about safely operating both ATVs and UTVs.
