## State 4-H'ers Learn While Observing Presidential Inauguration

Although they weren't standing on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., a group of Oklahoma 4-H'ers got a different perspective of the recent inauguration of Joseph R. Biden, the 46-th president of the United States.

Selected through an application and interview process, eight Oklahoma 4-H'ers were on tap to attend the inaugural festivities last month in Washington, D.C., but had to cancel the trip due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Four of the eight were able to attend an alternative event in Chickasha, Oklahoma, on inauguration day, with all social distancing guidelines in place. Taking part in the day's activities were Teegin Crosthwait, Payne County; Emily Ward, Mayes County; and Hunter Haxton and Emily Griffith, both of McClain County.

Cathleen Taylor, state leadership and civic engagement specialist with the State 4-H office at Oklahoma State University, said while it was disappointing to have to cancel the trip to Washington, D.C., she still wanted the Citizenship Washington Focus – Presidential Inauguration delegates to have a meaningful and educational experience.

"We had a lot of hands-on learning experiences for the delegates along with watching the inauguration itself," Taylor said. "Before the event, each delegate was assigned a type of government and they gave an oral presentation that day."

Taylor said the group also discussed all aspects of elections, including how to file to run for office, how to register to vote, as well as the various types of ballots.

Former Sen. Ron Justice, who served District 23 in Oklahoma, was on hand to share his personal experiences about his civil service.

"To learn the importance of elections and patriotism is absolutely critical to the future of our country and our freedom," Justice said. "It's important for today's youth to be involved and participate in the election process."

In addition, Taylor said the group played a Kahoot game about the presidential cabinet and what each role consists of and also watched the School House Rocks program about how a bill becomes a law.

Payne County 4-H'er Teegin Crosthwait, said she was excited to take part in the CWF-PI educational experience.

"It's very important for youth to be politically engaged. Ever since my trip to Washington, D.C. for the Citizenship Washington Focus trip, I've been more appreciative of our government and have been more politically active and engaged," Crosthwait said. "Even though we weren't able to attend the inauguration like we had hoped, seeing the process of events happening was still a cool experience. Hearing from Sen. Justice was very cool and informative." Hunter Haxton, an active 4-H'er from McClain County and who currently is serving as state 4-H president, said he believes it is important for today's youth to be politically engaged. "Through this experience, I learned more about our government, all of the different parts, how it functions and the importance of being involved," Haxton said. "It's important for youth to be politically involved and stay up to date because we are the future. We are blessed as Americans to be part of the process."

Taylor said she was pleased with how the day turned out. "We just made the most of the situation we were in, but as with all things in the Oklahoma 4-H program this last year, we'll continue to bend over backwards to make sure our club members get the best experience possible," she said. "As long as National 4-H Council continues to support CWF-PI, we will have delegates participate."

## February's Photo Contest

#### **Focal Point**

Photos need an obvious focal point to be really effective. Think about what you are trying to capture and communicate. Then take a moment to check all parts of the photo before you take it.

Photos can have three areas: a foreground, a background and a middle ground. The foreground is anything in the photo between you and your subject. Having something in the foreground can help provide framing and create depth. The background is everything behind the subject and can set the stage for what your are trying to communicate. Some photos have a sharply focused foreground. Some have a strong background like a sunset with a silhouetted horizon in the foreground.

Collect some photos of the same subject. Include a background in some of them a foreground in some and middle-ground in some.

## Twilling aka. Russian Embroidery, Palestrina Knot, Old English Knot

The needle art of twilling has been around for over 400 years. During the 17th century it was mainly used for borders and outlining designs on quilts, bedspreads, curtains and table cloths. Twilling consist of a series of knots connected to form a flowing design.

## 2021 County Cupcake Wars April 17, 2021

Registration is due to the county office March 31st.

RULES OF PLAY

Teams will consist of 2-3 team members. Teams will be assigned time slots based upon entry.



Each team will display three cupcakes.

- Each team will bring "naked" cupcakes. The cupcakes should have no frosting and be in the paper wrappers only.
- Each team will bring the frosting mixed in bowls. The frosting should not be tinted prior to contest. Teams will tint and place in frosting bags, if needed at the contest. Frosting can be either store bought or homemade. If store bought, can be either white or chocolate frosting.
- If teams are using fondant they can use either homemade or purchased fondant. Teams are allowed to purchase tinted (colored) fondant to use or may tint fondant off site.
- Teams are allowed to use purchased edible decorating items. Only edible items can be used on the cupcakes.
- There will be three team divisions. The age and grade will be as of September 1, 2019: Junior Division: minimum age 8 years old and in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, grades 3, 4 and 5 Intermediate Division: grades 6, 7 and 8 Senior Division: grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 There will be no move ups to make teams.
- 2. Each team will be directed to a preparation station.
- 3. Each team will have thirty minutes to prepare their entry and clean up the preparation area. Teams are allowed to bring their presentation scripts with them. Teams are allowed one picture no bigger than 8 x 10 of the item they are creating. It must not have any writing or directions on the picture.
- 4. Electricity will not be available at the contest. Teams should select their recipe with this in mind.
- 5. Each team must provide their own equipment.
- 6. Food safety: Teams should practice proper food safety and be prepared to discuss food safety practice used by their team in their presentation to the judges. Judges will ob serve preparation to assist in determining the score.
- 7. Presentation: When time is called, each team will present their entry and provide the following information:
  - -Introduction

-Creative dish name

-Two major nutrients

-Food preparation principles

-Food Safety

All team members must participate in the presentation; all team members must have a speaking role.

Judging time will include:

Four minutes for the presentation (THERE WILL BE NO TASTING)

One minute for judges to score (No comments will be given)

- No talking and no writing allowed among any team members while waiting to give the team presentation.
- 8. Clean-up: Teams must clean up their preparation areas. Clean-up time is included in the 30-minute preparation allotment. Teams should not plan to have access to a kitchen facility; therefore, dirty dishes should be placed in a plastic container, bag or box to be cleaned at home. Leftover food should be disposed of properly.
- 9. Placings will be based on rankings of teams by judges.' Judge's' decisions are final. 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> placings will be awarded in each division.


