### **Celebrating National 4-H Week and Oklahoma 4-H Month**



A proclamation was signed and presented recognizing October 6–12, 2025, as National 4-H Week and the month of October as Oklahoma 4-H Month in Tulsa County.

4-H youth exemplify the motto "To Make the Best Better," building leadership, citizenship, and life skills through hands-on learning and community service. Research from Tufts University shows that 4-H members are three times more likely to contribute to their communities than their peers.

In Oklahoma, nearly **200,000 youth** and **4,400 adult volunteers** participate in 4-H programs. In Tulsa County alone, more than **400 club members** and **22,000 students** engage in 4-H activities, supported by over **150 certified volunteers** and **2,500 episodic volunteers**.

**Stacey Jones**, Family and Consumer Sciences Educator, and **Jan Dawson**, County Extension Director, participated in the **Union Public** 

Schools Farm to Student event at Rosa Parks Elementary. Their station highlighted the importance of eating fruits and vegetables, and they offered samples of fresh watermelon salsa, which was a big hit among students.

The **Tulsa Master Gardeners** also participated in the event. Their station focused on the importance of **earthworms** in soil health and gardening. Students had the opportunity to **observe live worms up close** and learn how these helpful creatures improve soil by breaking down organic matter and enhancing plant growth.

National 4-H Week is a time to celebrate 4-H's mission and highlight the leadership, resilience, and confidence of youth. Schools in Broken Arrow, Skiatook, and Tulsa participated in healthy living activities and horticulture as part of the "Get Healthy" and "Grow Your Future" initiatives. Clubs also participated in community events and volunteerism as part of the "4-H for Good" and "Celebrate" initiatives. The YFR 4-H Club continues to pick up trash along the mile that their club sits on and fills the Broken Arrow Blessing Box weekly for neighbors in need. ## Hands-On Learning in the Field: Educators Gain Real-World Experience at Wyant Farms



Tulsa County OSU Extension recently hosted the Northeast District Ag Producer Visit In-Service at Wyant Farms, a local cattle operation east of Tulsa. The training, designed for county educators across the district, offered a full day of hands-on learning and practical livestock management experience.

The event was coordinated by **Hannah Hough**, Tulsa County OSU Extension Agriculture Educator, and **Earl** 

**Ward**, Northeast Area Livestock Specialist. Together, they built a program focused on immersing new educators in the realities of on-farm management and problem-solving — from pasture evaluation to herd health practices.

Participants began the day in the pasture, where discussions and demonstrations covered **fertilizing**, **weed control**, **forage production**, **and rotational grazing strategies**. The morning continued with a **hands-on cattle working session**, giving educators the chance to learn by doing — drawing blood, administering vaccines, implanting beef calves, practicing fence line weaning, weighing cows and calves, culling management, and even castration techniques.

After lunch, Earl led an **on-farm cow pregnancy testing workshop** utilizing the blood samples pulled to let the producer know that all his cows were bred, followed by an interactive **livestock nutrition exercise** that tied together the day's lessons in herd management and decision-making.

While the agenda was packed with educational value, one theme resonated throughout the day: the power of strong producer relationships. Hannah has worked closely with **Frank Wyant**, owner of Wyant Farms, since just six days after starting her position in January 2024. Through numerous field visits and in-office sessions, she has provided guidance on weed and pasture grass identification, rotational grazing, stocking rate adjustments, weed control strategies, and herd health improvements. Frank also completed Tulsa County's first Master Cattleman Series, led by Hannah.

"The most striking thing about the day was seeing the relationship Hannah has built with Frank," said NE Area ANR leader Scott Clawson. "It's clear he truly trusts and values her

recommendations. That kind of producer-educator connection is what Extension is all about."

The event exemplified the mission of OSU Extension — connecting research-based information with real-world application. By providing hands-on learning in a genuine production setting, Hough and Ward helped equip new educators with the skills and confidence to better serve their own county producers.

It was a very worthwhile day for everyone involved. Earl and Hannah wanted to make sure educators walked away with practical knowledge they could immediately apply — and they couldn't have done that without producers like Frank who are willing to open their operations for the benefit of others.
