# OSU Extension Promotes Civic Engagement Across the State

Civic Engagement is an important component of all communities – big and small – across Oklahoma, but how does one get started? Oklahoma State University Extension can help. Mike Stout, Oklahoma State University Extension Specialist and George Kaiser Family Foundation Endowed Chair in Family and Community Policy, works with communities to address public issues.

"Our mission is to strengthen families and communities across the state through community-driven programs that address public issues," Stout said. "It's critical to meet the needs of community residents and civic engagement helps meet that goal."

This is where OSU Extension programming fills a need. Extension programs enhance opportunities that involve all stakeholders in self-governance and participants can develop:

 $\cdot$  Civic skills that enable individuals to engage in informed decision-making, collaborate with others and contribute to the betterment of their communities and society.

· Tailored approaches for civic engagement around public issues.

 $\cdot$  Tools, skills, and resources for community-driven approaches to identifying and prioritizing issues.

 $\cdot$  The ability to work collaboratively with other individuals, organizations, and decision-makers to address local issues.

"For more than a century, OSU Extension has partnered with community groups to foster the development of citizens who are not only informed but engaged in improving their communities," he said. "We are here to help communities adopt participatory approaches to solving local issues."

There's a saying that goes like this: It takes a village. There are no truer words. Building strong communities takes everyone pulling together to get things done and make things happen. For goals to be set and acted upon, community members unite in public deliberation. Stout said this provides a platform for citizens to discuss, weigh different perspectives, evaluate the implications of different options and contribute to decisions of concern to the families who call the community home.

## **Herb Preservation**

Washing: Rinse your herbs gently in a large bowl of cool water to avoid damaging leaves and delicate stems.

Drying: Lay out paper towels on your counter. Lift the wet herbs from the water, allow excess water to drip off, and then place them on the towels.

Soft Herbs (e.g., parsley, cilantro, mint):

Storage Method: Place them in a glass of water, cover the top with a plastic bag, and cinch it at the bottom.

Hard Herbs (e.g., rosemary, thyme, sage):

Storage Method: Loosely wrap them in a damp paper towel and keep them in a tightly sealed container or reusable bag in the fridge.

## POSITIVE PARENTING TIPS 6-8 Years Old

#### **Developmental Milestones**

Middle childhood brings many changes in a child's life. By this time, children can dress themselves, catch a ball more easily using only their hands, and tie their shoes. Having independence from family becomes more important now.

Events such as starting school bring children this age into regular contact with the larger world. Friendships become more and more important. Physical, social, and mental skills develop quickly at this time. This is a critical time for children to develop confidence in all areas of life, including through friends, schoolwork, and sports.

#### **Emotional/Social Changes**

Children in this age group might:

- Show more independence from parents and family.
- Start to think about the future.
- Understand more about their place in the world.
- Pay more attention to friendships and teamwork.
- Want to be liked and accepted by friends.

#### **Thinking and Learning**

Children in this age group might:

- Show rapid development of mental skills.
- Learn better ways to describe experiences.
- Learn better ways to talk about thoughts and feelings.
- Have less focus on oneself and more concern for others.

#### **Building Strong Connections**

#### Following are some of the things you, as a parent, can do to help your preschooler during this time:

- Talk with your child about school, friends, and things they look forward to in the future.
- Talk with your child about respecting others. Encourage them to help people in need.
- Do fun things together as a family, such as playing games, reading, and going to events in your community.
- Get involved with your child's school. Meet the teachers and staff and get to understand their learning goals and how you and the school can work together to help your child do well.
- Continue reading to your child. As your child learns to read, take turns reading to each other.
- Support your child in taking on new challenges. Encourage them to solve problems, such as a disagreement with another child, on their own.
- Encourage your child to join school and community groups, such as team sports, or to take advantage of volunteer opportunities.

#### **Fostering Responsibility and Positive Behavior**

- Show affection for your child. Recognize their accomplishments.
- Help your child develop a sense of responsibility—ask them to help with household tasks, such as setting the table.
- Help your child learn patience by letting others go first or by finishing a task before going out to play. Encourage them to think about possible consequences before acting.


- Make clear rules and stick to them, such as how long your child can watch TV or when they have to go to bed. Be clear about what behavior is okay and what is not okay.
- Use discipline to guide and protect your child, rather than punishment to make them feel bad about themselves. Follow up any discussion about what not to do with a discussion of what to do instead.
- Praise your child for good behavior. It's best to focus praise more on what your child does ("you worked hard to figure this out") than on traits they can't change ("you are smart").
- Help your child set their own achievable goals—they'll learn to take pride in themselves and rely less on approval or reward from others.

#### **Child Safety First**

More physical ability and more independence can put children at risk for injuries from falls and other accidents. Motor vehicle crashes are the most common cause of death from unintentional injury among children this age.

- Teach your child to watch out for traffic and how to be safe when walking to school, riding a bike, and playing outside.
- Make sure your child understands water safety, and always supervise them when they are swimming or playing near water.
- Supervise your child when they are engaged in risky activities, such as climbing.
- Talk with your child about how to ask for help when they need it.
- Keep potentially harmful household products, tools, equipment, and firearms out of your child's reach.
