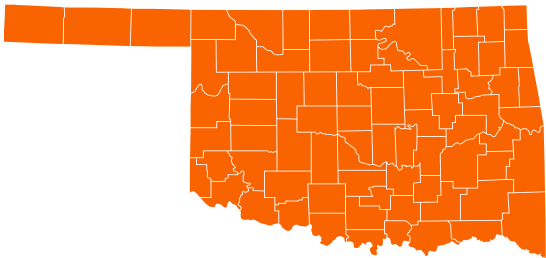

# 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

## Contribution

4-H'ers are **four times more likely** to give back to their communities and **two times more likely** to make healthier choices than their peers according to a recent national 4-H Replication and Reconnection Study.
